School Improvement Grants, authorized under section 1003(g) of Title I of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965 (Title I or ESEA) as amended by ARRA, are grants, through the Texas Education Agency, to local educational agencies (LEAs) for use in Title I schools identified for improvement, corrective action, or restructuring and other eligible campuses that demonstrate the greatest need for the funds and the strongest commitment to use the funds to provide adequate resources in order to raise substantially the achievement of their students so as to enable the schools to make adequate yearly progress and exit improvement status. Under the final requirements, as amended through the interim final requirements published in the Federal Register in January 2010 school improvement funds are to be focused on each State's "Tier I" and "Tier II" schools.

Tier I schools are a State's persistently lowest-achieving Title I schools in improvement, corrective action, or restructuring and certain Title I eligible elementary schools that are as low achieving as the State's other Tier I schools. Tier II schools are a State's persistently-lowest achieving secondary schools that are eligible for, but do not receive, Title I, Part A funds and certain additional Title I eligible secondary schools that are as low achieving as the State's other Tier II schools or that have had a graduation rate below 60 percent over a number of years. An LEA may also use school improvement funds in Title I schools in improvement, corrective action, or restructuring that are not identified as persistently lowest-achieving schools and certain additional Title I eligible schools ("Tier III schools").

In the Tier I and Tier II schools an LEA chooses to serve, the LEA must implement one of four school intervention models: turnaround model, restart model, school closure, or transformation model.

#### Allowable Activities

Tier I and Tier II Grantees

- Grantees must expend grant funds for the required activities delineated for the selected intervention model as defined in the final federal regulations.
- Grantees may expend grant funds for the permissible activities delineated for the selected intervention model as defined in the final federal regulations.
- Grantees may expend grant funds for other school improvement activities deemed needed to address identified needs not addressed by the intervention model selected.

#### Tier III Grantees

- Tier III grantees may select one of the four intervention models in the federal regulations or the state's Tier III Transformation Model.
- If selecting one of the four models in the federal regulations, grantees must expend grant funds for the required activities delineated for the selected intervention model as defined in the final federal regulations. Grantees may expend grant funds for the permissible activities delineated for the selected intervention model as defined in the final federal regulations.
- Grantees may expend grant funds for other school improvement activities deemed needed to address identified needs not addressed by the intervention model selected.

In addition, a Tier I, Tier II, Tier III grantee campus that has implemented, in whole or in part, either the Turnaround, Restart, or Transformation models within the last two years may continue or complete the implementation of the intervention model with the TTIPS grant funds. For example, if a grantee campus has replaced its principal within the last two years, the LEA/campus will not be required to hire another new principal. An LEA/campus that receives TTIPS SIG funds in accordance with this flexibility must fully implement the selected model as required by the final federal requirements. In other words, if the school had been implementing the model only in part, it must use the funds it receives to expand its implementation so that it fully complies with the federal regulatory requirements.

The detailed required and permissible activities for each intervention model, as defined in the final federal regulations are listed on Schedule #4—Program Requirements and are incorporated by reference herein.

The focus at Splendora Jr. High School has been on student success, hiring and retention of highly qualified teachers and staff, and student and teacher attendance rate. In the 2009-2010 school year the campus was staffed with highly qualified teachers. The continuation of research-based curriculum, CScope (Region VI's) curriculum and common-based assessments were implemented on the campus. All these initiatives were put into place at the beginning of the school year and have reflected an increase of student success in both TAKS and Common-based Assessments. However, there are still fundamental weaknesses at the campus level. Although these initiatives have shown an increase to a proficient level of academic success, Splendora Jr. High School has reached a level of complacency and student achievement has stagnated. For this reason, the school year, 2010-2011 the principal will be replaced. Based on the campus' needs assessment, surveys and TAKS scores the campus will fully implement a comprehensive plan to increase student success. The plan would encompass a total school redesign based on a framework that would produce a true learning community within the school, where the principal and teachers would have shared common vision of becoming a learning organization, engage students and staff to improve student achievement, use data to identify and implement success based on needs of students. A hyper-monitoring teacher walk-through system will be implemented for data collection on instructional strategies and student level of engagement. Another area of concern is the lack of staff to assist struggling learners, the technology and instructional materials to assist these students. The funding from this grant will provide employing highly qualified staff, additional materials for student engagement, and technology in core subjects. Splendora Independent School District (SISD) has selected the modified transformation model. SISD will collaborate with the Schlechty Center; Working on the Work: A Framework for Schoolwide Reform- Engaging Student and Staff to Improve Achievement. The Schlechty Center for Leadership in School Reform works by engaging principals and school staff to develop a plan based on premises, mutual commitments and a three-phased implementation plan that further articulates a school vision, intended results and the means and processes for measuring the results. As part of the collaboration, the Schlechty Center will provide consultants with expertise in building capacity, provide and designing training experiences and tools, intellectual scaffolding, and providing networking opportunities to sustain the program.

Splendora ISD believes in open lines of communication, collaboration with stakeholders and continuous program(s) evaluation. In 2009 the campus was staffed with highly qualified teachers, a new research-based curricula was implemented, and teachers received professional development. Also there has been increased community awareness and parent involvement and participation.

The comprehensive needs assessment began with a district wide and campus surveys provided to parents via website in the spring of the school year. This survey included questions on student outcomes and student success, accessibility to the campus administration, counseling services and the climate of the campus to name a few. In addition to the surveys, longitudinal data from TAKS scores, common-based assessments, and student portfolios were used to identify voids in academic structure at Splendora Jr. High School and at the district level. SISD also gathered data on cohorts of students to find trends on student groups and longitudinal assessment data.

SISD created several committees consisting of administrators, curriculum coordinators, teachers and parents to address concerns in both the surveys and academic achievement. After reviewing this data, the areas of concern include gaps in achievement and passing rates in some student groups in certain grades levels, and over a time period. In addition, systemically there is a lack of cohesiveness in programs within the district, between grade levels on the campus and even within grade levels.

In Splendora ISD, as in most districts; there is a correlation between students' grade-level passing rates, attendance rates, and graduation rates. Although SISD has aggressively addressed these areas, and there has been an increase in all areas, SISD's goal is to have a unified district wide belief and commitment to reduce the learning gaps between student groups, and increase student engagement and success rates. Thus, ultimately extinguishing failure rate and drop-out rate.

The lack of program cohesiveness reflects the need of teacher collaboration, and shared school-wide commitment and vision. It is apparent that SISD's focus needs to be on school wide collaboration, where the principals and teachers have a clear, consistent and shared understanding of what students are expected to know. In addition, teachers will be provided training in understanding the role of the teacher to be a leader, designer and guide instruction.

Another area of concern that addresses student achievement are, programs designed to help underachieving middle school student prepare for and succeed in college, technology for be used for remediation in core subjects, and the lack of staff to assist struggling learners. SISD will seek to employ highly qualified staff to assist struggling students.

Splendora will be collaborating with Schlechty Center to develop a learning organization and create learning communicates that focus on transforming Splendora Jr. High School from a compliance-focused organization to an engagement focused organization. SISD will also use Lead Your School tools and technology for classroom walkthroughs to monitor and support teachers' instructional strategies and engagement.

Splendora ISD will use the Title I Priority School Grant to support a framework for school wide reform. The school reform will begin with campus wide intensive professional development from the Schlechty Center, hiring additional staff to work with struggling students, increase student success by purchasing materials and remediation software for core subjects. In addition, the funding will be used purchase a teacher observation walkthrough program.

The funding will be used for professional development from the Schlechty Center Working on the Work: A framework for School Wide Reform, As outlined in the budget page SISD will collaborate with the Schlechty Center in providing the necessary professional development, tools and materials need to effectively implement the transformation model. In addition, student achievement will also be the focus of this grant.

Having a unified district-wide vision for preparing students for either Early High School college classes or Career and Technology is the ultimate goal of Splendora Independent School District. In efforts to reach this goal, SISD believes that early intervention for struggling students is the key. SISD will use these funds to employ highly qualified staff to assist struggling students. The staff will provide intervention instruction in the classroom and in a lab setting where small student-group intervention will take place. The instructional staff will also receive professional development and work collaboratively with the classroom teacher(s). Funding will also support materials for classrooms such as teaching kits and manipulatives for hands-on learning in science. In addition, software will be purchased for every core subject. The software will be used campus-wide and will be web-based through the district's server. The software will be used as an additional teaching tool as well as an intervention tools to support the curriculum.

The Title I Priority School Grant will also fund a teacher observation, walk-through system for teachers. With the use of these venues SISD communicates with the students, parents, and community. April 2010, district wide and campus surveys were provided to parents via SISD's website. The information from the surveys was reviewed and SISD created several committees consisting of administrators, curriculum coordinators, teachers and parents to address concerns. From this information recommendations were gained and will used in planning for the 2010-2011 school year. In addition, results from these surveys were reported publically.

The superintendent meets monthly with Key Communicators. During these meeting the superintendent discusses current programming and any other issues that the members would like to discuss.

In addition to the venues already in place, the Jr. High School will hold an information forum in August 2010 for parents and community members. At this meeting, the district will review the comprehensive plan in initiating and sustaining school wide reform outlined within this grant. The campus calendar delineating future meetings (once each semester) will be posted on the district main website to encourage parents and community members to attend. Communication will also continue through the school newsletters sent home weekly.

Again in the spring of 2010 school year, surveys with questions specifically targeted on questions concerning student performance and achievement, collaboration, relationships with school administration and faculty and the overall parent teacher and student satisfaction will be conducted. In Splendora Independent School District from the superintendent to campus administrators this vision is clear and the commitment is non-surpassing. The vision for all students in Splendora Independent School District is called the "Wild Cat Way" The Wild Cat Way is the continuum of programming from full day Pre-Kindergarten though high school. As reflected in the diagram on page 31 of this grant. The Wild Cat Way conscientiously planned, and intention to prepare students to a path of either college bound or career bound. Students, parents, counselors and administrators meet at least semi-annually beginning in 5<sup>th</sup> grade to discuss each student's college or career and technology pathway. The Wild Cat Way is the path that leads students for either college and/or career readiness has been SISD's dropout prevention plan.

The commitment to ensure the implementation of intervention will take place in a concise and effective manner. It will occur in several ways. First, a new principal to be hired will have had at least three years of administration experience and has a proven record of high student achievement. In addition, the district assures that the campus will be staffed with highly-qualified teachers and staff according the criteria of No Child Left Behind.

Next, in order to provide ongoing, high-quality, job-embedded, professional development, SISD will collaborate with Schlechty Center. This process will begin with the superintendent, curriculum department and the Jr. High school's principal and assistant principal is commitment to building a partnership with the Schlechty center. Next, the principals will attend the comprehensive two-day principal training. Whereas, teachers and staff will attend a three-day comprehensive training from the Schlechty Center. The campus will then embrace the training provided by the Schlechty center and will use the built-in on-site support provided by a Schlechty consultant to ensure that the focus of the transformation model takes place. Splendora ISD assures that the funds under this proposal will be used to increase state, local and federal funds. Other initiatives that SISD will be implementing will be paid out of local, state and federal funding sources.

Splendora Independent School District's salary scale is higher than the state scale, and is competitive with the surrounding area schools. For this reason, SISD can attract highly qualified teachers in subject specific shortage areas. SISD believes that teacher and student attendance affects student achievement and reduces the likely-hood for dropouts. Therefore, SISD has an incentive plan for teachers, staff, administrators, cafeteria, custodial and maintenance employees and administrators. This incentive plan includes paying 1% of the average teacher salary for 96% teacher attendance, another 1% for 96% of student attendance and additional 1% if Splendora Jr. High School becomes Recognized Campus. This incentive plan is funded through local funds.

Splendora ISD will pay for one-half the Program Managers salary from ARRA funds. In addition, SISD will pay the salary from a combination of local, state and federal funding.

SISD has received the Beginning Teacher Induction Mentoring Grant, Cycle 3; This support will provide teacher mentors for new teachers to the profession. The mentor teacher will have at least three years teaching experience, and a record of increasing student achievement. All new teachers (to the profession) assigned to the Jr. High School will be given a mentor teacher. The incentive will be \$1,000 to be paid at the end of the school year.

SISD has also received the District Awards for Teacher Excellence (DATE) grant which is a strategic compensation program for teacher. 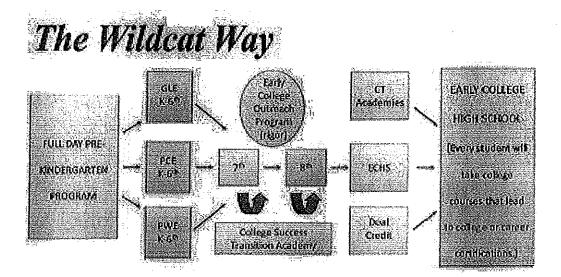

Splendora Independent School District (SISD) has begun an aggressive transformation both district and campus wide. It is SISD's commitment and responsibility for all students to graduate either with college credits, with college readiness skills or with skills gained for Career and Technology Academies (CTA). This belief is outlined in what the district calls "The Wild Cat Way" (shown below). The Wild Cat Way has been implemented district wide and it is a purposeful and calculated plan to prepare students to lead to a path of either college bound or career bound.

In order for the Wild Cat Way to be the most successful, Splendora Jr. High School which feeds into Splendora High School must prepare students for the rigor of either college or Career and Technology Academies.



Splendora Jr. High School (SJHS) is the targeted campus, and where the transformation model is currently in place. The focus at the Jr. High School has been on student success, hiring and retention of highly qualified teachers and staff, and student and teacher attendance rate. In the 2009-2010 school year the campus was staffed with highly qualified teachers. The continuation of research-based curriculum, CScope (Region VI's) curriculum and common-based assessments were implemented on the campus. All these initiatives were put into place at the beginning of the school year and have reflected an increase of student success in both TAKS and Common-based Assessments. However, there are still fundamental weaknesses at the campus level. Although these initiatives have shown an increase to a proficient level of academic success, SJHS has reached a level of complacency and student achievement has stagnated. In the fall and spring of the 2009-2010 school year several committees were formed to gather and review data, and to make recommendations to the school-board and the superintendent. In addition, surveys were given to the community, parents, students, teachers, and staff.

SISD is committed to increasing academic success and reaching the goal of preparing every student in "The Wild Cat Way, and being an Exemplary school district. For this reason, SISD will continue with the modified transformation model and will use the Texas Title I Priority School Grant to develop a comprehensive school plan. The plan would encompass a total school redesign based on a framework that would produce a true learning community within the school, where the principal and teachers would have shared common vision of becoming a learning organization, engage students and staff to improve student achievement, use data to identify and implement success based on needs of students. A hypermonitoring teacher walk-through system will be implemented for data collection on instructional strategies and student level of engagement. In addition, materials and software will be used as intervention strategies for struggling students. Finally, a strategic compensation plan for teachers will implemented.

#### Improving School Climate, and Increasing Leadership Effectiveness:

In the spring semester the superintendent formed a committee consisting of the assistant superintendent, directors, and other administrators. This committee's goal was to gather data from surveys, and research on SJHS school climate and leadership effectiveness. The committee gained three important issues to be addressed. First, there was a need for a shared campus-wide vision. Secondly, they recommended teachers have more time to collaborate in ways to increase student achievement. Lastly, they recommended providing teachers professional development to increase the relevance and rigor of lessons.

Splendora ISD will target several areas identified to improve school climate and increasing effectiveness. Improving school climate will begin with a comprehensive professional development plan for both administrators and teachers. SISD has chosen the Schlechty Center for Leadership in School Reform. The Schlechty Center has developed a national network with over 30 school districts, and 18 of these school districts are in Texas. The Schlechty Center has developed partnerships with school leaders across the country to transform their classrooms, schools, and school districts from places focused on compliance to those focused on engagement. SISD will use the Title I Priority School Grant to partnership with the Schlechty Center. This partnership will provide ongoing comprehensive training for central office administrators, the campus principals and teachers throughout the three years of the grant cycle.

Professional development opportunities for the newly-hired campus principal will include a Principals Academy (Leadership Development conference) sponsored by the Schlechty Company. This academy will provide the campus principal with a deep understanding of fundamental concepts such as the nature of engagement, the core of business of school and marketing the change. The principal will develop plan for leadership, exploring the role of the principal and including appropriate strategies for causing and sustaining change, and work to create and sustain engagement-centered schools. In years two and three the principal will attend the Schlechty Center's Leadership academy. Besides the principal academies the principal will also attend Design Team Conference and Coaching for Design Level II that will be a collaborative-teaming effort between the lead teachers on the campus and the principal.

As stated above, SISD will seek to employ a principal who has been a school principal for at least three years, with a record of high student achievement and the willingness to embrace the vision of the district. He will be required to participate and lead the campus in professional development and execute the strategies learned from the Schlechty Center. He or she will support and utilize teacher leaders to improve instruction, increase teacher collaboration time, monitor student data, and be a resource to the campus and stakeholders. The principal will keep open lines of communication with the superintendent, the program manager of the grant, teachers, staff, and other stakeholders.

Improving Academic Performance, Increasing the use of Student Data and Increasing Learning Time:

Splendora Independent School District (SISD) commitment is to increase academic performance. In doing so, SISD will provide extensive professional development to gain instruction strategies, the use of student data to drive purposeful instruction, and increase students learning time. SISD will use several strategies to increase academic performance.

In late fall of 2009, a committee consisting of administrators, teachers and parents were assembled to review data on student performance and academic achievement. This committee reviewed Splendora Jr. High School's current year's data, longitudinal data and cohort data. This committee found trends in some student groups in certain grade levels, and over a given time period. As this committee reviewed the student data it was apparent that there was a lack of rigor and relevance. The achievement gaps were evident in programming between classrooms and between grade levels.

To begin this comprehensive process SISD will provide extensive professional development to administrators and teachers on the Jr. High campus. The professional development will be a combination of in-depth trainings, teacher and administrator collaboration, and onsite consultation. The Schlechty Center for Leadership in School Reform will provide the professional development for the duration of the grant.

Research shows that students who are engaged in learning, make connections to newly learned concepts, and can work at higher levels of cognition. Research also shows that there is a direct correlation between the caliber of schoolwork students are provided and the willingness of students to engage in schoolwork. Teachers and teacher leaders will participate in several learning opportunities to develop these strategies. All Jr. High School teachers will attend a threeday training called Working on the Work: A Framework for School Wide Reform, Engaging Students and Staff to Improve Achievement. This training will include three phases of school wide reform. Phase One: Engaging the Staff will include a clear vision and a shared understanding of that students are expected to know and be able to do a various grade levels, teachers collaborate with one another at their grade level and grade levels above and below, and design work around "hard-to-teach and difficult-to-learn concepts. Phase Two: will increase teachers' collaboration and communication, teachers will examine measures of student engagement, and the school will share with the district Innovative practices and lessons. Phase Three: will reflect student gains in learning, teachers will routinely collaborate with one another within the school and across the levels of the school system, principals and teachers see the relationship between the innovative use of resources and the success of the students using a range of performance measures. Lead teachers will have at least five years of experience, have a high student achievement rate including higher than district's average on TAKS Commended Performance, and excellent communication skills. The lead teachers on SJHS will attend additional professional development. This includes Coaching for Design Level II and Design Team conference. Both of these conferences will be conducted by the Schlechty Center. These conferences are specifically designed for teacher leaders, and curriculum coordinators on the campus. These individuals will be trained to build capacity at all levels and will impact school improvement.

SISD will continue to use the Region VI Educational Service Center CScope Curricula. This curricula is research-based, comprehensive curriculum, and over 30 districts are using this successful curriculum. Surveys and committee recommendations have identified a need for teachers to be able to collaborate in a group as assigned on grade levels and review data in a timely manner. SISD will implement weekly curriculum meetings to discuss academic achievement and gaps in student learning. In addition, teachers will have a common planning period which will allow for collaboration between teachers, lead teachers, curriculum coordinators and the campus principal. Strategies gained from extensive professional development will be implemented in the planning process.

According to NCES, "Students from low income families were ten times more likely to drop out of school between 2006-2007 than students living in high-income families". Researchers believe this is due to lack of academic success, and student engagement or meaningful connections to school. The Title I Priority School Grant will fund for three comprehensive programs that will provide opportunities for academic support, classes that encourage student engagement, and support for first generation college students. These programs are Advancement Via Individual Determination (AVID), Agile Minds, and Academic Youth Development. AVID is a program designed to help underachieving middle school and high school students prepare for and succeed in college. AVID offers a rigorous program of academic instruction. It teaches students how to study, read for content and take notes and students participate in study groups. Agile Minds is a research-based computer software program that with a concentration on math and problem solving through the use of technology. The program, Academic Youth Development (AYD) will be for students who failed one or more TAKS tests in any of his or her educational history, and/or failed a CORE subject the previous year and/or has been retained or has a history of truancy. These comprehensive programs support SISD's vision of the Wild Cat Way (diagram on page 31.)

#### **Increasing Parent and Community Involvement:**

Splendora Independent School District has a Community Education Department within the school district. The Community Education Department will work collaboratively with SJHS to encourage and support parent involvement activities. The principal of SJHS will work with the teachers to invite the community and parents to at least 4 family nights during the school year. These will include information on classes offered at the Jr. High and High school, student's career interests and skills inventory, and college night.

We feel that engaging the parents of our students as well as our community as a whole, is vital to building a network of learning and support for our students. We will pursue high levels of involvement from both these parties.

  - SAS means the Standard Application System of which the application document is a part;
  - "Application" means the entire package submitted by the Applicant including the schedules contained in the application and so indicated on the General Information page of the application package;
  - Amendment means an application that is revised in budget categories and/or in program activities. It includes both the
    original application and any subsequent amendments; or extensions thereto;
  - Works means all tangible or intangible material, products, ideas, documents or works of authorship prepared or created by Contractor for or on behalf of TEA at any time after the beginning date of the Contract (Works includes but is not limited to computer software, data, information, images, illustrations, designs, graphics, drawings, educational materials, assessment forms, testing materials, logos, trademarks, patentable materials, etc.); and,

    - (I) meets all applicable Federal, State, and local health and safety requirements;

    - (II) successful completion, in each of the academic subjects in which the teacher teaches, of an academic major, a graduate degree, coursework equivalent to an undergraduate academic major, or advanced certification or credentialing; and

- 6. **Recovery Independent Advisory Panel**: Section 1541 of the ARRA establishes the Recovery Independent Advisory Panel to make recommendations to the Recovery Accountability and Transparency Board on action the Board could take to prevent fraud, waste, and abuse relating to ARRA funds.

App.) and section 3145 of title 40, United States Code (Section 1606).
- M. Compliance with OMB Circular A-133 Audits and Schedule of Expenditures of Federal Awards: Grantees agree to separately identify the expenditures for each grant award funded under ARRA as required by Office of Management and Budget Circular A-133, "Audits of States, Local Governments, and Non-Profit Organizations" and to comply with all other provisions of the Single Audit Act and OMB Circular A-133.
