In other words, if the school had been implementing the model only in part, it must use the funds it receives to expand its implementation so that it fully complies with the federal regulatory requirements.

The Roma High School Leadership team has selected to implement the Tier III Transformation Model in conjunction with the School Excellence Model. We will expand and create curriculum that is integrated into the School Excellence Model format with activities required from the Transformation Model. The School Excellence Model provides a framework of goals, key practices, and key conditions for accelerating learning and setting higher academic standards. It is the School Excellence Model's belief that in the right school environment all students can learn complex academic concepts and be college ready. The model coincides with the milestones and strategies of the Critical Success Factors which are requirements of the Quarterly Implementation Reports (QIR). The School Excellence Model has seven key components: Establishing a Culture of Excellence, Leadership, Behaviors and Relationships, Responsive Pedagogy, Organizational Practice, Family/Community Engagement, and Capacity Building. This grant will allow Roma High School to create an organizational structure and a process that improves student learning, specifically targeting our At-risk, English Language Learners, and Special Education student populations. With this grant, we plan to expand and improve our program to include the following: 1) increase leadership effectiveness that relates to being able to achieve the School Excellence Model's goals, 2) increase teacher quality to include staff development and training to target our special needs student population, 3) create integrated core content area curricula that aligns to several instructional areas and are developed by Roma High School staff to meet the unique needs of our students, 4) provide necessary instructional resources that promote 21st Century Learning Skills, 5) establish extended days (morning/afternoon) and Saturday academies for at-risk students, 6) create a teacher mentor program for 1st and 2<sup>nd</sup> year teachers for administrative/instructional support and guidance, 7) create team/culture building opportunities that promote teachers' professional growth, 8) develop a student advisory system to ensure students have a teacher mentor and a support system throughout their high school years, 9) increase opportunities for input and communication with students' parents and other stakeholders to form a communityoriented school that supports life- long learning, and 10) continue to expand our technology capabilities and ongoing job-embedded professional development using tech-based supports and interventions. The funds from this grant will make it possible to have all the key conditions in place to be able to integrate the improvement activities as called for by the Tier III Transformation Model and the School Excellence Model. We will also have in place the means and long term sustainability to focus the program to meet the unique needs of the Roma High School community for the long term, including preparing for the State of Texas Assessment of Academic Readiness (STAAR) standards and end-of-course exams. With Roma ISD's Department of Student Improvement, the District's Improvement Plan, and the Roma High School Campus Improvement Plan aligned to the Tier III Transformation Model and the School Excellence Model's key components, we will be able to structure campus transformation that is sustained and maintained for the long term.

A Campus Needs Assessment was initiated by the campus principal to determine Roma High School's strengths and needs as an instructional institution. Upon administrative consideration through the campus leadership team, the idea was brought forth and unanimously supported by the SBDM committee which approved applying for the grant and to go forward with creating the different committees for each of the respective eight areas. A staff meeting was held to introduce the Texas Priority Schools Grant information. Volunteers were then requested to be part of the application process and more specifically to be part of one of the eight committees that would identify the strengths and needs of Roma High School. The Campus Needs Assessment committees were assigned to address issues of strengths, needs, and develop plans and summary statements for eight focus areas. The eight different areas of focus are; Demographics, Student Achievement, School Culture & Climate, Staff Quality Recruitment & Retention, Curriculum Instruction & Assessment, Family & Community Involvement, School Context & Organization, and Technology. The 48 member volunteer committee included 8 Administrators, 7 Counselors, 6 Lead Teachers, 25 Core and Non-Core Teachers, 1 Attendance Clerk, and 1 Librarian. The 48 members were assigned to one of the 8 committees with an Administrator or Counselor assigned as chairperson. Each committee was assigned questions for their area of focus and determined strengths and needs based on various data resources reviewed. Some of the data resources used, but not limited to: Roma I.S.D's Educational Improvement Plan (DEIP), Roma High School Campus Improvement Plan (CIP), the Student Academic Indicators (SAI, formerly AEIS), Campus Student Assessment Data/Reports (TAKS, TAKS-M, TAKS-Acc, TAKS-Alt, TELPAS, ACT, PSAT, THEA, AP), staff and student data taken from the Public Education Information Management System (PEIMS), Performance Based Monitoring & Analysis System (PBMAS) reports, Final Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP) data tables, Roma High School Master Schedule, core area instructional calendars, and teachers' instructional lesson plans/learning guides. Each committee met over several hours to review the data sources and submitted and presented a Summary of Needs (findings) report to the overall committee. Based on the findings, it was determined that extensive teacher professional development is needed to accommodate the at-risk populations, specifically the English Language Learner, Special Ed., Recent Immigrant, and Migrant students. It was also determined that Roma High School needs a more comprehensive type of instructional program that is differentiated from the normal classroom instruction so that learning styles of subgroups and at-risk students may be better met, including the inclusion of an extended day tutorial program for at-risk students to include mornings, afternoons, and Saturdays. In addition, parental involvement of at-risk students must be increased. Technology tools need to be expanded to include teacher laptops to aid in the delivery of instruction and data disaggregation. There is a real need of student-accessible technology resource labs. The need of building a collaborative culture among teachers, staff, and students is evident, including the establishment of a teacher/student advisory and mentor program. Recognition for teachers and students will be initiated to promote increased academic success.

Roma High School administrators and district administrators attended the TTIPSG training at Region I Service Center. This was an informational session to inform all eligible campuses of this grant. Afterwards, Roma High School conducted a leadership team meeting composed of 7 administrators, 5 counselors, 4 core area lead teachers, 1 career and technical lead teacher, 1 special education lead teacher, 1 foreign language lead teacher, and 1 registrar. In addition, a site based decision making meeting in reference to applying for this grant was held. Stakeholders invited included students, staff members, parents, community members and district office personnel. After dialogue and deliberation on the purpose of this grant, the participants voted that Roma High School should use the Tier III Transformation Model with its respective improvement activities and proceed in applying for this grant.

Ensuring ongoing monitoring and continuous improvement is critical to the successful completion of the project. The project will be managed at the campus level by the Project Manager(s). They will coordinate the grant and activities and will be responsible for the day-to-day operation of the program and coordinating the efforts of the various projects, staff members, and community stakeholders. The high school principal will also provide program management at the site level for Roma High School. He will work with the Associate Principals, Counselors, Department Heads, and lead teachers in developing learning plans and specific intervention strategies for each of the students in the program. The counselors will work to assist administration and educators to identify strengths and weaknesses in the student population. They will also be responsible to implement the Individualized Graduation Plans (IGP). Department Heads for the four core areas will assist to the ongoing management of the grant. The remainder of the staff that works with at-risk students will be actively involved in providing classroom experiences that contribute to the success of the at-risk students. All members of the leadership team will be given a written description of their personal roles and responsibilities in the grant. All instructional staff will hold valid teacher certification and be highly qualified.

The leadership team will design a timeline that demonstrates the on-going monitoring of instruction. Student attendance records will be reviewed weekly to identify students with excessive absences and/or academic failures. Teacher-parent conferences/contacts with identified students will be conducted as needed. Student attendance in Extended Day (morning, afternoon, and Saturdays) tutorials will be monitored on a daily basis. Class work and homework assignments for participating students will be reviewed weekly with classroom teachers to identify objectives to be addressed in the tutorial or individual activity sessions. Report cards will be reviewed each grading period to ensure that students are maintaining a passing grade in all subject areas. Progress on TAKS remediation sessions will be tracked, and results on the pre-TAKS (Benchmarks) will be used as a guide for further remediation strategies. Individual classroom teachers will monitor the effectiveness of the supplemental materials relevant to student learning. Additionally, Roma High School will continue to improve with the current monitoring program.

Administrators, counselors, teachers, and other professional staff are actively involved in making decisions about staff development based upon demonstrated student success. The decisions made are based upon student mastery of specific learning objectives on TAKS, classroom performance, attendance records, promotion/retention data, Public Educational Information & Management System (PEIMS) data, and Academic Excellence & Indicator System (AEIS) reports. Core area teachers will participate in on-going job embedded professional development program including but not limited to; Sheltered Instruction, Relevance, Rigor, and Relationships, Limited English Proficient/English Language Learner (LEP/ELL) instructional strategies, Content & Language Objective training, Maximizing instructional and learning time, and positive behavioral support systems.

Working in cooperation with Region I Educational Service Center, the School Improvement Resource Center (SIRC), Intercultural Development & Research Association (IDRA), the Sheltered Instruction Observation Protocol (SIOP) Institute, and Region XIII Educational Service Center, we will provide teachers with the appropriate professional development and guidance to assist with teaching and learning. All on-going job embedded staff development must fit an objective in our Campus Improvement Plan (CIP) and must be pre-approved by campus administration. All of the core area teachers will participate in staff development that enables them to work effectively with the at-risk students. Administrators will ensure that the staff development each teacher attends fits a criterion on the Campus Improvement Plan along with District Educational Improvement Plan; and that, according to the description, staff development will assist our students in becoming successful through their high school education and pursue higher levels of learning. Sign-in rosters, agendas, and training materials will be kept to confirm teacher attendance. Documented administrative walk thrus will ensure strategies that impact student learning are actually being implemented in the classroom. Teachers will also receive certificates of attendance/participation.

The project manager(s) will be responsible for this evaluation at the Roma High School campus. The reports will specifically focus on data and information gathered through the effectiveness indicators included in the program activities. Our evaluation plan will address four key areas with specific strategies for determining answers to each area. The first area addressed is the extent to which the activities of the project were implemented as planned. We will continually examine a timeline projection for each activity as stated. In addition, we will check the schedule of activities against a list of activities in the grant proposal. Monthly calendars and instructionally focused calendars will be created for the project, and those will be distributed to each stakeholder. We will also send reminders via e-mail to ensure that the project is implemented as planned. The second area addressed is the effectiveness of the activities in achieving the goals and objectives of the project, ensuring increased student learning. We will design an evaluation instrument which examines the effectiveness indicators for each activity and determines the extent to which the goals and objectives were achieved. We will also survey students, mentors, and staff involved in the project to determine effectiveness. The third area addressed is the impact of the activities on the participants. We will conduct ongoing evaluation of participants to determine impact of the program. We will request the staff make anecdotal records of student impact. Teacher observation records will also be used as an impact indicator. Reports will determine the number of students who graduate within four years and how many attempt college-level or AP courses, both which will prove the program's impact. The final area addressed is the extent to which the performance targets were met. In order to determine this area, written progress reports will be submitted to RISD and TEA on a quarterly basis. The data gathered for the report will establish clear benchmarks to monitor progress toward identified local program objectives, as well as indicators to assess the impact on stated goals. We will focus on performance targets including:

\*number and percentage of participating students graduating in four years

\*number and percentage of participating students taking dual credit or AP courses

\*decrease in the number of discipline referrals

The information gained from the evaluation process will be used in the development of the District's Educational Improvement Council and the Campus Improvement Plan. The staff will use the information gained to help the campus reform and restructure teaching on the campus so that all our students' needs are met. The materials acquired with the grant fund will be integrated into the instruction in the foundation core area classes so that there is a flow from the program to the curriculum. We will also implement a longitudinal assessment of targeted population participants to determine individual outcomes which can be attributed to the activities of this grant project.

Qualitative and quantitative data will be collected from a variety of sources, including teacher and counselor data, the SAI report, Six-Week Grade data, Six-Week Exam data, Benchmark data, TAKS results data, RSCCC/PEIMS data, and DMAC reports. These systems will provide frequent data and analysis opportunities. The data will enable stakeholders to view individual data by TEKS objective so that instructional strategies and materials are always focused on specific areas of need for each student. In addition, the software will enable program staff to disaggregate data by student group (e.g., ethnicity, socioeconomic status, LEP, Special Education), enabling administrators, teachers, and resource staff to quickly identify additional or different resources that may benefit a given group of students. Data will also be disaggregated by teacher or classroom, and can thus inform teachers' individual professional development plans, highlighting specific content and/or areas in which the teacher may need additional training, which will benefit their students. Collected data will be ongoing and used to monitor the program. Written activity/progress reports will be submitted to Roma ISD and TEA on a quarterly basis. The data gathered through the evaluation plans for achievement, mentoring, and professional development programs will be reported to RISD and TEA. The reports will focus on data and information gathered through the effectiveness indicators included in program activities. Data collection methods will include reports based upon annual disaggregation of TAKS reports, both campus and individual student, classroom records, and all classroom summative and formative evaluation information. In addition, Roma High School plans to use our Individual Graduation Plans to collect data including credit recovery, TAKS objectives to address, and intervention required. Roma High School will use the Individual Graduation Plans to monitor student progress and will submit a report to RISD and TEA with the results.

The staff at Roma High School under the leadership of the project manager(s) will review student records at the end of each three week and six-week grading period to identify students who are in danger of failing a course, or who have excessive absences contributing to credit loss. Using collected data from student records, anecdotal records, classroom assessments, department assessments, and benchmark testing, additional students will be identified for intervention through the program to ensure they make adequate progress toward graduation within four years of entering high school. Current efforts will begin by examining individual reports from the Spring 2010 TAKS data. Using TAKS data and actual number of credits earned as a baseline, teachers, counselors, GEAR UP (Gaining Early Awareness and Readiness of Undergraduate Programs) facilitator, and administrators will identify students at-risk of not graduating with their peer group (cohort), including taking in consideration any failure of one or more sections on the TAKS test, and work on increasing these students' learning time during, but not limited to, the school day by scheduling them to in-school tutorial, enrichment, and credit recovery classes. Once these students are identified, these staff members will further identify student expectation and learning objective strengths and weaknesses, including monitoring these students' attendance to school. In addition, for students who require assistance in academic achievement, RHS will offer a before, during, and after school Extended Day program to help students accomplish the following: reinforcement of student expectations and objectives that any given student is having difficulty in, make up all missing assignments, earn a passing grade in all classes, remain on schedule for advancement to the next grade, and graduating with all peers. The Extended Day program will target those students at-risk but will be offered to all students who fit any of the concern areas. The program will serve the four core curricular areas of English Language Arts, Mathematics, Science, and Social Studies. Extended Day tutorials will be scheduled according to the student's individual needs. These Extended Day tutorials will also offer students the opportunity to focus on TEKS remediation in the four core areas as well as class and homework assignments. Individual students that will be targeted as at-risk will include Limited English Proficient, Special Education, and Migrant students.

In addition to soliciting feedback from stakeholders—including students, teachers, administrators, parents, mentors, and project staff, Roma ISD and Roma High School will design an evaluation plan that employs multiple achievement indicators, including student grade reports, TAKS passing rates, percentage of grade retentions, improved student performance indicators, improved attendance, increased student credits received, number of students participating in dual credit courses, number of students taking AP exams, number of students graduating, and percentage of students pursuing post secondary education.

Student attendance in before school, after school, Saturday School, and Summer School programs will be monitored on a daily basis. Class work and homework assignments for participating students will be reviewed weekly with classroom teachers to identify objectives to be addressed in the Extended Day tutorials or individual activities in the program. Student Instructional Intervention Plans (SIIP) will be required of all teachers to identify students at-risk of failing the six-weeks and to better project ways of helping the students improve academically. Report cards will be reviewed each grading period to ensure that students are maintaining a passing grade in the core area subjects. Progress on TAKS remediation sessions will be monitored, and results on our Pre-TAKS (benchmarks) will be used as a guide for further remediation strategies during Extended Day and TAKS Prep Academies. The information gained from the evaluation of this grant will be used as another data source for modifying the campus improvement plan and to improve the program itself.

General Prohibitions: None of the funds authorized under the No Child Left Behind Act shall be used to develop or distribute materials, or operate programs or courses of instruction directed at youth, that are designed to promote or encourage sexual activity, whether homosexual or heterosexual; to distribute or to aid in the distribution by any organization of legally obscene materials to minors on school grounds; to provide sex education or HIV-prevention education in schools that instruction is age appropriate and includes the health benefits of abstinence; or to operate a program of contraceptive distribution in schools (P. L. 107-110, section 9526).
- Q. Armed Forces Recruiter Access to Students and Student Recruiting Information: In accordance with guidance issued by the U. S. Department of Education, each local educational agency receiving assistance under the No Child Left Behind Act shall provide, on a request made by military recruiters or an institution of higher education, access to secondary school students names, address, and telephone listings, upon prior written consent of a student or the parent of a student. A secondary school student or the parent of the student may request that the student's name, address, and telephone listing not be released without prior written parental consent, and the local educational or private nonprofit school shall notify parents of the option to make a request and shall comply with any request. Each local educational agency receiving assistance under the No Child Left Behind Act shall provide military recruiters the same access to secondary school students as is provided generally to post secondary educational institutions or to prospective employers of those students (P. L. 107-110, section 9528).
- R. Unsafe School Choice Option: The local educational agency certifies that it shall establish and implement a policy requiring that a student attending a persistently dangerous public elementary school or secondary school, as determined by the Texas Education Agency, or who becomes a victim of a violent criminal offense, while in or on the grounds of a public elementary or secondary school that the student attends, be allowed to attend a safe public elementary or secondary school within the local educational agency, including a public charter school (P. L. 107-110, section 9532).
- S. Civil Rights: Nothing in the No Child Left Behind Act shall be construed to permit discrimination on the basis of race, color, religion, sex (except as otherwise permitted under Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972), national origin, or disability in any program funded under the No Child Left Behind Act (P. L. 107-110, section 9534).

    - (D) is nonsectarian in its programs, admissions policies, employment practices, and all other operations, and is not affiliated with a sectarian school or religious instruction;
    - (E) does not charge tuition;
    - (F) complies with the Age Discrimination Act of 1975, Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972, section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, and Part B of the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act;
    - (G) is a school to which parents choose to send their children, and that admits students on the basis of a lottery, if more students apply for admission than can be accommodated;
    - (H) agrees to comply with the same Federal and State audit requirements as do other elementary schools and secondary schools in the State, unless such requirements are specifically waived for the purpose of this program;
    - (I) meets all applicable Federal, State, and local health and safety requirements;
    - (J) operates in accordance with State law; and
    - (K) has a written performance contract with the authorized public chartering agency in the State (i.e., SBOE) that includes a description of how student performance will be measured pursuant to State assessments that are required of other schools and pursuant to any other assessments mutually agreeable to the SBOE.
  - Community-Based Organization: A public or private nonprofit organization of demonstrated effectiveness that is representative of a community or significant segment of a community and that provides educational or related services to individuals in the community.
  - Core Academic Subjects: English, reading or language arts, mathematics, science, foreign languages, civics and government, economics, art, history, and geography.

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# 4. Highly Qualified:

- (A) when used with respect to any public elementary school or secondary school teacher teaching in a State, means that—
  - (i) the teacher has obtained full State certification as a teacher (including certification obtained through alternative routes to certification) or passed the State teacher licensing examination, and holds a license to teach in such State, except that when used with respect to any teacher teaching in a public charter school, the term means that the teacher meets the requirements set forth in the State's public charter school law; and
  - (ii) the teacher has not had certification or licensure requirements waived on an emergency, temporary, or provisional basis;
- (B) when used with respect to-
  - (i) an elementary school teacher who is new to the profession, means that the teacher-
    - (I) holds at least a bachelor's degree; and
    - (II) has demonstrated, by passing a rigorous State test, subject knowledge and teaching skills in reading, writing, mathematics, and other areas of the basic elementary school curriculum (which may consist of passing a State-required certification or licensing test or tests in reading, writing, mathematics, and other areas of the basic elementary school curriculum); or
  - (ii) a middle or secondary school teacher who is new to the profession, means that the teacher holds at least a bachelor's degree and has demonstrated a high level of competency in each of the academic subjects in which the teacher teaches by-
    - (I) passing a rigorous State academic subject test in each of the academic subjects in which the teacher teaches (which may consist of a passing level of performance on a State-required certification or licensing test or tests in each of the academic subjects in which the teacher teaches); or
    - (II) successful completion, in each of the academic subjects in which the teacher teaches, of an academic major, a graduate degree, coursework equivalent to an undergraduate academic major, or advanced certification or credentialing; and
- (C) when used with respect to an elementary, middle, or secondary school teacher who is not new to the profession, means that the teacher holds at least a bachelor's degree and-
  - (i) has met the applicable standard in clause (i) or (ii) of subparagraph (B), which includes an option for a test; or
  - (ii) demonstrates competence in all the academic subjects in which the teacher teaches based on a high objective uniform State standard of evaluation that-
    - (I) is set by the State for both grade appropriate academic subject matter knowledge and teaching skills;
    - (II) is aligned with challenging State academic content and student academic achievement standards and developed in consultation with core content specialists, teachers, principals, and school administrators;
    - (III) provides objective, coherent information about the teacher's attainment of core content knowledge in the academic subjects in which a teacher teaches;
    - (IV) is applied uniformly to all teachers in the same academic subject and the same grade level throughout the State;
    - takes into consideration, but not be based primarily on, the time the teacher has been teaching in the academic subject;
    - (VI) is made available to the public upon request; and
    - (VII) may involve multiple, objective measures of teacher competency.
- 5. Parental Involvement: The participation of parents in regular, two-way and meaningful communication involving student academic learning and other school activities, including ensuring:
  - (A) that parents play an integral role in assisting their child's learning;
  - (B) that parents are encouraged to be actively involved in their child's education at school;
  - (C) that parents are full partners in their child's education and are included, as appropriate, in decision making and on advisory committees to assist in the education of their child; and
  - (D) the carrying out of other activities, such as those described in section 1118 of P. L. 107-110.

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# Professional Development includes activities that:

- (A) improve and increase teachers' knowledge of the academic subjects the teachers teach, and enable teachers to become highly qualified;
- (B) are an integral part of broad schoolwide and districtwide educational improvement plans;
- (C) give teachers, principals, and administrators the knowledge and skills to provide the students with the opportunity to meet challenging State academic content standards and student academic achievement standards;
- (D) improve classroom management skills;
- (E) are high quality, sustained, intensive, and classroom-focused in order to have a positive and lasting impact on classroom instruction and the teacher's performance in the classroom and are not one-day or short-term workshops or conferences;
- (F) support the recruiting, hiring, and training of highly qualified teachers, including teachers who became highly qualified through State and local alternative routes to certification;
- (G) advance teacher understanding of effective instructional strategies that are:
- (H) based on scientifically based research (except for programs under Title II, Part D, Enhancing Education Through Technology of this Act); and
- strategies for improving student academic achievement or substantially increasing the knowledge and teaching skills of teachers; and
- are aligned with and directly related to State academic content standards, student academic achievement standards, and assessments and the curricula and programs tied to the standards;
- are developed with extensive participation of teachers, principals, parents, and administrators of schools to be served under this Act;
- are designed to give teachers of limited English proficient children, and other teachers and instructional staff, the knowledge and skills to provide instruction and appropriate language and academic support services to those children, including the appropriate use of curricula an assessments;
- (M) to the extent appropriate, provide training for teachers and principals in the use of technology so that technology and technology applications are effectively used in the classroom to improve teaching and learning in the curricula and core academic subjects in which the teachers teach;
- (N) as a whole, are regularly evaluated for their impact on increased teacher effectiveness and improved student academic achievement with the findings of the evaluations used to improve the quality of professional development;
- (O) provide instruction in methods of teaching children with special needs;
- (P) include instruction in the use of data and assessments to inform and instruct classroom practice;
- (Q) include instruction in ways that teachers, principals, pupil services personnel, and school administrators may work more effectively with parents; and
- (R) may include activities that:
  - (i) involve the forming of partnerships with institutions of higher education to establish school-based teacher training programs that provide prospective teachers and beginning teachers with an opportunity to work under the guidance of experienced teachers and college faculty;
  - (ii) create programs to enable paraprofessionals (assisting teachers employed by an LEA receiving assistance under Title I Part A) to obtain the education necessary for those paraprofessionals to become certified and licensed teachers; and
  - (iii) provide follow-up training to teachers who have participated in activities described previously in this definition that are designed to ensure that the knowledge and skills learned by the teachers are implemented in the classroom.

- (A) means research that involves the application of rigorous, systematic, and objective procedures to obtain reliable and valid knowledge relevant to education activities and programs; and

- 9. Technology: State-of-the-art technology products and services.

Successful completion of the early implementation will be measured in the <a href="Model Selection and Description Report">Quarterly Implementation Reports</a>, the <a href="Model Selection and Description Report">Model Selection and Description Report</a>, and through participation in TEA technical assistance. Copies of the above named reports can be found on the TTIPS website at the following link: <a href="http://www.tea.state.tx.us/index4.aspx?id=7354&menu">http://www.tea.state.tx.us/index4.aspx?id=7354&menu</a> id=798
  - a. The Model Selection and Description Report must be submitted to TEA no later than <u>February 1, 2011</u>. This report may be submitted at any time prior to the deadline. Grantees must demonstrate successful completion of the following activities:
    - i. Comprehensive Needs Assessment process.
    - ii. Establish the grant budget by the required categories.
    - iii. Identification and Selection of the intervention model.
    - iv. Development of activities to implement selected intervention model.
    - v. Development of Timeline of Grant Activities.
- 2) The applicant provides assurance that the LEA will designate an individual or office with primary responsibilities for supporting the LEA/campus' school improvement efforts. This individual/office will have primary responsibility and authority for ensuring the effective implementation of the grant option approved by TEA; serve as the district liaison to TEA and those providing technical assistance and/or contracted service to the LEA/campus as part of the approved grant.
- The applicant provides assurance that a team from the grantee LEA/campus will attend and participate in grant orientation meetings, technical assistance meetings, other periodic meetings of grantees, the Texas School Improvement Conference, and sharing of best practices.

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- 4) For LEAs selecting the TEA Designed Model, the applicant must participate in and make use of technical assistance and coaching support provided by TEA, SIRC, and/or its subcontractors.
- The applicant will establish or provide evidence of a system of formative assessment aligned to the Texas Essential Knowledge and Skills which provides robust, targeted data to evaluate the effectiveness of the LEA's curriculum and its alignment with instruction occurring on the campus; assesses progress on student groups' academic achievement at the campus level; and guide instructional decisions by teachers for individual students.
- The applicant will participate in a formative assessment of the LEA's capacity and commitment to carry out the grant intervention models.
- The applicant will provide access for onsite visits to the LEA and campus by TEA, SIRC and its contractors.
- The applicant, if selecting the Restart Model, agrees to contract only with CMO or EMO providers on the State's approved list of CMO and EMO providers.
- The applicant, if selecting the Turnaround Model or Transformation Model (Tiers I and Tiers II only) agrees to the participation of the campus principal or principal candidates in a formative assessment of their turnaround leadership
- If the LEA/Tier III campus selects to implement the transformation model, the campus assures that it will it implement the following federal requirements.
  - 1. Develop and increase teacher and school leader effectiveness.
    - A. Evaluate the effectiveness of the current principal and use the results of the evaluation to determine whether the principal should be replaced, be retained on the campus, or be provided leadership coaching or training.
    - B.Identify and reward school leaders, teachers, and other staff who, in implementing this model, have increased student achievement and high school graduation rates and identify and remove those who, after ample opportunities have been provided for them to improve their professional practice, have not done so;
    - C.Provide staff ongoing, high-quality, job-embedded professional development (e.g., regarding subject-specific pedagogy, instruction that reflects a deeper understanding of the community served by the school, or differentiated instruction) that is aligned with the school's comprehensive instructional program and designed with school staff to ensure they are equipped to facilitate effective teaching and learning and have the capacity to successfully implement school reform strategies; and
    - D.Implement such strategies as financial incentives, increased opportunities for promotion and career growth, and more flexible work conditions that are designed to recruit, place, and retain staff with the skills necessary to meet the needs of the students in a transformation school based on rigorous, transparent, and equitable evaluation systems for teachers and principals:
      - 1. Takes into account data on student growth as a a factor as well as other factors such as multiple observation-based assessments of student performance and ongoing collections of professional practice reflective of student achievement and increased high school graduation rates; and
      - Are designed and developed and with teacher and principal involvement
  - 2. Comprehensive instructional reform strategies.
    - Use data to identify and implement an instructional program that is research-based and vertically aligned from one grade to the next as well as aligned with State academic standards; and
    - Promote the continuous use of student data (such as from formative, interim, and summative assessments) to inform and differentiate instruction in order to meet the academic needs of individual students.
  - 3. Increasing learning time and creating community-oriented schools.
    - A. Establish schedules and strategies that provide increased learning time; and
    - B. Provide ongoing mechanisms for family and community engagement.
  - Providing operational flexibility and sustained support.
    - A. Give the school sufficient operational flexibility (such as staffing, calendars/time, and budgeting) to implement fully a comprehensive approach to substantially improve student achievement outcomes and increase high school graduation rates; and
    - B. Ensure that the school receives ongoing, intensive technical assistance and related support from the LEA, the SEA, or a designated external lead partner organization (such as a school turnaround organization or an EMO).
  - 11) An LEA may also implement other strategies to develop teachers' and school leaders' effectiveness, such as-
    - A. Provide additional compensation to attract and retain staff with the skills necessary to meet the needs of the students in a transformation school;
    - B. Institute a system for measuring changes in instructional practices resulting from professional development; or
    - C. Ensure that the school is not required to accept a teacher without the mutual consent of the teacher and principal, regardless of the teacher's seniority.

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- 12) An LEA may also implement comprehensive instructional reform strategies, such as-
  - A. Conduct periodic reviews to ensure that the curriculum is being implemented with fidelity, is having the intended impact on student achievement, and is modified if ineffective;
  - B. Implement a school wide "response-to-intervention" model;
  - C. Provide additional supports and professional development to teachers and principals in order to implement effective strategies to support students with disabilities in the least restrictive environment and to ensure that limited English proficient students acquire language skills to master academic content;
  - D. Use and integrate technology-based supports and interventions as part of the instructional program; and
  - E. In secondary schools--
    - 1) Increase rigor by offering opportunities for students to enroll in advanced coursework (such as advanced Placement; International Baccalaureate; or science, technology, engineering, and mathematics courses, especially those that incorporate rigorous and relevant project-, inquiry-, or design-based contextual learning opportunities), early-college high schools, dual enrollment programs, or thematic learning academies that prepare students for college and careers, including by providing appropriate supports designed to ensure that low-achieving students can take advantage of these programs and coursework;
    - 2) Improve student transition from middle to high school through summer transition programs or freshman academies;
    - 3) Increase graduation rates through, for example, credit-recovery programs, re-engagement strategies, smaller learning communities, competency-based instruction and performance-based assessments, and acceleration of basic reading and mathematics skills; or
    - 4) Establish early-warning systems to identify students who may be at risk of failing to achieve to high standards or graduate.
- 13) An LEA may also implement other strategies that extend learning time and create community-oriented schools, such as--
  - A. Partner with parents and parent organizations, faith- and community-based organizations, health clinics, other State or local agencies, and others to create safe school environments that meet students' social, emotional, and health needs:
  - B. Extend or restructure the school day so as to add time for such strategies as advisory periods that build relationships between students, faculty, and other school staff:
  - C. Implement approaches to improve school climate and discipline, such as implementing a system of positive behavioral supports or taking steps to eliminate bullying and student harassment; or
  - D. Expand the school program to offer full-day kindergarten or pre-kindergarten.
- 14) The LEA may also implement other strategies for providing operational flexibility and intensive support, such as—
  - A. Allow the school to be run under a new governance arrangement, such as a turnaround division within the LEA or SEA: or
  - B. Implement a per-pupil school-based budget formula that is weighted based on student needs.
- 15) The LEA/campus assures TEA that data to meet the following federal requirements will be available and reported as requested.
  - a. Number of minutes within the school year.
  - b. Average scale scores on State assessments in reading/language arts and in mathematics, by grade, for the "all students" group, for each achievement quartile, and for each subgroup.
  - c. Number and percentage of students completing advanced coursework (e.g., AP/IB), early-college high schools, or dual enrollment classes. (High Schools Only)
  - d. College enrollment rates. (High Schools Only)
  - e. Teacher Attendance Rate
  - f. Student Completion Rate
  - g. Student Drop-Out Rate
  - h. Locally developed competencies created to identify teacher strengths/weaknesses
  - i. Types of support offered to teachers
  - j. Types of on-going, job-embedded professional development for teachers
  - k. Types of on-going, job-embedded professional development for administrators
  - Strategies to increase parent/community involvement
  - m. Strategies which increase student learning time

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By submitting the application for American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA) funds (P.L. 111-5), the applicant agrees to comply with the following provisions and assurances for all programs authorized in Division A of the ARRA, Title I School Improvement Grant (SIG). The applicant understands that failure to comply with one or more of these provisions and assurances may result in the Texas Education Agency (TEA) taking one or more enforcement actions authorized in Title 34 of the Code of Federal Regulations (CFR) §§ 74.62 and 80.43.

In addition to the standard terms of award, all funding provided under the Recovery Act will be subject to the provisions, assurances and conditions for American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 (ARRA or Recovery Act).

## Terms defined:

RECIPIENT – The term "recipient" means a State and includes the Texas Education Agency (TEA). It also includes any entity that applies for and receives a grant directly from the federal government.

RECOVERY FUNDS —The term "recovery funds" means any funds that are made available from appropriations made under the Recovery Act.

GRANTEE - the subrecipient of TEA and applicant of funds.

**A. One-Time Funding**: Unless otherwise specified, ARRA funding is considered one-time funding that is expected to be temporary. Grantees should expend funds in ways that do not result in unsustainable continuing commitments after the funding expires. Grantees must move rapidly, while using prudent grant management practices, to develop plans for using funds, consistent with the ARRA's reporting and accountability requirements, and promptly begin spending funds to help drive the nation's economic recovery. When an obligation is made is defined in 34 CFR 76.707.

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- C. Compliance with Other Provisions and Assurances: All provisions and assurances stated in the General Provisions, Certification Regarding Debarment and Suspension, Lobbying Certification and Disclosure of Lobbying, No Child Left Behind Act (NCLB) Special Provisions and Assurances, and all other program-specific provisions and assurances apply unless they conflict or are superseded by the following terms and conditions implementing the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 (ARRA) requirements below. This includes compliance with Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964; Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973; Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972; the Age Discrimination Act of 1975; and all other nondiscrimination provisions. It also includes Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 (prohibiting race, color, national origin, religion, and sex discrimination in employment; the Americans with Disabilities Act (prohibiting disability discrimination in employment and in services provided by entities receiving federal funds); as well as any other applicable civil rights laws. By submitting this application, the applicant agrees to comply with all such provisions and assurances.
- **D. Compliance with Other Program Statutes:** The applicant agrees to comply with the authorizing program statutes, regulations, non-regulatory guidelines, and other guidance in the implementation of the programs receiving funding under ARRA. This includes compliance with comparability; supplement, not supplant; maintenance of effort (MOE); equitable participation for private nonprofit school students and teachers; and all other program-specific provisions and requirements. All such are hereby incorporated by reference.
- **E. DUNS Number:** All entities receiving any federal funds, including ARRA funds, are required to have a DUNS (Dunn & Bradstreet) number. The DUNS number serves as the grantee organization's unique identifier for reporting federal funds received and expended. TEA must use this same DUNS number to report grant awards and expenditures for subrecipients under ARRA to the website specifically provided for in ARRA <a href="http://www.FederalReporting.gov/">http://www.FederalReporting.gov/</a>. The information may change pending final adoption by OMB.

Access of Government Accountability Office (GAO): Each contract and each subcontract awarded using funds made available under ARRA shall provide that the Comptroller General of the United States and his representatives are authorized to examine any records of the contractor or any of its subcontractors, or any State or local agency administering such contract, that directly pertain to, and involve transactions relating to, the contract or subcontract and to interview any officer or employee of the contractor or any of its subcontractors, or of any State or local government agency administering the contract, regarding such transactions (Section 902).
- 3. **Reviews by Inspector General:** The inspector general of the U.S. Department of Education shall review, as appropriate, any concerns raised by the public about specific investments using funds made available in this Act. Any findings of such reviews shall be relayed immediately to the Secretary of Education. In addition, the findings of such reviews, along with any audits conducted by any inspector general of ARRA funds, shall be posted on the inspector general's website and linked to the recovery.gov website, except that portions of reports may be redacted to the extent the portions would disclose information that is protected from public disclosure under sections 552 and 552a of Title 5, United States Code (Section 1514).
- 4. 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- Recovery Independent Advisory Panel: Section 1541 of the ARRA establishes the Recovery Independent Advisory
  Panel to make recommendations to the Recovery Accountability and Transparency Board on action the Board could
  take to prevent fraud, waste, and abuse relating to ARRA funds.
- **J. Disclosure of Fraud or Misconduct:** Each grantee awarded funds made available under the ARRA shall promptly refer to the USDE Office of Inspector General any credible evidence that a principal, employee, agent, contractor, subrecipient, subcontractor, or other person has submitted a false claim under the False Claims Act or has committed a criminal or civil violation of laws pertaining to fraud, conflict of interest, bribery, gratuity, or similar misconduct involving those funds.
- **K. Protection for Whistleblowers**: Section 1553 of the ARRA provides protection for State and local government and contractor whistleblowers. Any employee of any employer receiving ARRA funds may not be discharged, demoted, or otherwise discriminated against as a reprisal for disclosing, including a disclosure made in the ordinary course of an employee's duties, to the Recovery Accountability and Transparency Board, an inspector general, the U. Comptroller General, a member of Congress, a State or federal regulatory or law enforcement agency, a person with supervisory authority over the employee (or such other person working for the employer who has the authority to investigate, discover, or terminate misconduct), a court or grand jury, the head of a federal agency, or their representatives, information that the employee reasonably believes is evidence of (1) gross mismanagement of an agency contract or grant relating to ARRA funds; (2) a gross waste of ARRA funds; (3) a substantial and specific danger to public health or safety related to the implementation or use of ARRA funds; (4) an abuse of authority related to the implementation or use of ARRA funds; or (5) a violation of law, rule, or regulation related to an agency contract (including the competition for or negotiation of a contract), or grant, awarded or issued relating to ARRA funds. A person who believes that he or she has been subjected to a reprisal may submit a complaint regarding the reprisal to the inspector general for the appropriate federal agency (in most cases, the U.S. Department of Education).
- **L. Use of Funds:** The grantee agrees to comply with the applicable federal cost principles in the obligation and expenditure of ARRA funds as identified in the General Provisions and Assurances as well as other limitations or restrictions and expenditures identified therein. The grantee also agrees to the following:
- Consolidation of ARRA Administrative Funds: Due to the significant reporting requirements under ARRA, it is
  not known at this time whether grantees may consolidate ARRA administrative funds with other NCLB
  consolidated administrative funds. TEA will issue further guidance with regard to this provision once guidance is
  provided by the U.S. Department of Education. If ARRA funds are permitted to be consolidated with other NCLB
  consolidated administrative funds, grantees must still be able to report the types and number of jobs that were
  created or saved with ARRA funds.
- 2. **Combining ARRA funds on a Schoolwide Program.** ARRA funds are permitted to be used on a Title I Part A schoolwide Campus/Program, funds may be combined with other funding sources, but grantees still must be able to identify precisely the items of obligation and expenditure for ARRA reporting. - 3. **Special Contracting Provisions**: To the maximum extent possible, contracts funded under the ARRA shall be awarded as fixed-price contracts through the use of competitive procedures. 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- Use of Funds for Certain Expenditures Prohibited: ARRA funds shall not be used for any casino or other gambling establishment, aquarium, zoo, golf course, or swimming pool (Section 1604).
- 5. **Use of Funds for Construction Prohibited:** Unless specifically authorized in the applicable program statute, regulations, guidelines, Request for Application (RFA), TEA Standard Application System (SAS), the approved grant application, or other written authorization, none of the ARRA additional formula funds shall be used for construction, remodeling, or renovation.
- 6. **Buy American Use of American Iron, Steel, and Manufactured Goods:** If construction is allowed and approved pursuant to the previous paragraph pertaining to "Use of Funds for Construction Prohibited", none of the funds may be used for the construction, alteration, maintenance, or repair of a public building or public work unless all of the iron, steel, and manufactured goods used in the project are produced in the United States unless waived by the Secretary of Education (Section 1605).
- 7. Wage Rate Requirements for Contracted Laborers and Mechanics—Compliance with the Davis-Bacon Act: Subject to further clarification issued by the Office of Management and Budget, and notwithstanding any other provision of law and in a manner consistent with other provisions of ARRA, all laborers and mechanics employed by contractors and subcontractors on projects funded directly by or assisted in whole or in part by and through the Federal Government pursuant to this award shall be paid wages at rates not less than those prevailing on projects of a character similar in the locality as determined by the Secretary of Labor in accordance with subchapter IV of chapter 31 of title 40, United States Code. With respect to the labor standards specified in this section, the Secretary of Labor shall have the authority and functions set forth in Reorganization Plan Numbered 14 of 1950 (64 Stat. 1267; 5 U.S.C. App.) and section 3145 of title 40, United States Code (Section 1606).
- M.
