Summary of Program: Purpose and Goals

School Improvement Grants, authorized under section 1003(g) of Title I of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965 (Title I or ESEA) as amended by ARRA, are grants, through the Texas Education Agency, to local educational agencies (LEAs) for use in Title I schools identified for improvement, corrective action, or restructuring and other eligible campuses that demonstrate the greatest need for the funds and the strongest commitment to use the funds to provide adequate resources in order to raise substantially the achievement of their students so as to enable the schools to make adequate yearly progress and exit improvement status. Under the final requirements, as amended through the interim final requirements published in the Federal Register in January 2010 school improvement funds are to be focused on each State's "Tier I" and "Tier II" schools.

Tier I schools are a State's persistently lowest-achieving Title I schools in improvement, corrective action, or restructuring and certain Title I eligible elementary schools that are as low achieving as the State's other Tier I schools. Tier II schools are a State's persistently-lowest achieving secondary schools that are eligible for, but do not receive, Title I, Part A funds and certain additional Title I eligible secondary schools that are as low achieving as the State's other Tier II schools or that have had a graduation rate below 60 percent over a number of years. An LEA may also use school improvement funds in Title I schools in improvement, corrective action, or restructuring that are not identified as persistently lowest-achieving schools and certain additional Title I eligible schools ("Tier III schools").

In the Tier I and Tier II schools an LEA chooses to serve, the LEA must implement one of four school intervention models: turnaround model, restart model, school closure, or transformation model.

Allowable Activities

Tier I and Tier II Grantees

- Grantees must expend grant funds for the required activities delineated for the selected intervention model as defined in the final federal regulations.
- Grantees may expend grant funds for the permissible activities delineated for the selected intervention model as defined in the final federal regulations.
- Grantees may expend grant funds for other school improvement activities deemed needed to address identified needs not addressed by the intervention model selected.

Tier III Grantees

- Tier III grantees may select one of the four intervention models in the federal regulations or the state's Tier III Transformation Model.
- If selecting one of the four models in the federal regulations, grantees must expend grant funds for the required activities delineated for the selected intervention model as defined in the final federal regulations. Grantees may expend grant funds for the permissible activities delineated for the selected intervention model as defined in the final federal regulations.
- Grantees may expend grant funds for other school improvement activities deemed needed to address identified needs not addressed by the intervention model selected.

In addition, a Tier I, Tier II, Tier III grantee campus that has implemented, in whole or in part, either the Turnaround, Restart, or Transformation models within the last two years may continue or complete the implementation of the intervention model with the TTIPS grant funds. For example, if a grantee campus has replaced its principal within the last two years, the LEA/campus will not be required to hire another new principal. An LEA/campus that receives TTIPS SIG funds in accordance with this flexibility must fully implement the selected model as required by the final federal requirements. In other words, if the school had been implementing the model only in part, it must use the funds it receives to expand its implementation so that it fully complies with the federal regulatory requirements.

The detailed required and permissible activities for each intervention model, as defined in the final federal regulations are listed on Schedule #4—Program Requirements and are incorporated by reference herein.

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In considering solutions to resolve the academic issues that exist, Pasadena I.S.D. reviewed and amended the district strategic plan to target many areas including technology embedded in instruction and college and career readiness on all levels. The following activities of the proposed school improvement program are consistent with the goals and objectives of the Pasadena I.S.D. Strategic Plan:

- Develop and increase teacher and school leader effectiveness (Federal Statutory Requirement 21.1)
 External providers will be hired to assess and coach campus leadership. Content area specialists will be hired to coach teachers on how to use data from campus-based and teacher-designed assessments to address identified gaps and weaknesses for individual classes Job-embedded professional development will focus on lesson plan development and teacher-designed assessments that have a greater impact on learning and that are tied to the Student Expectations. Additionally, new assessments will be created for leadership and teachers.
- Comprehensive instructional reform strategies (Federal Statutory Requirement 21.1) Reading, math and science curriculum will undergo auditing, revision, and alignment for all grade levels. Teachers will use disaggregated data to guide instruction and to engage in collaborative planning that addresses student needs. The implementation of peer tutoring will aid students in performing highly in content areas and build their self-esteem. Teachers will use student-led conferences to empower their students to take responsibility for their learning.
- Increase learning time and create community-oriented schools (Federal Statutory Requirement
 21.1) Zero hour will allow students to take a class, for credit, before the regular school day begins. Access to
 300 hours of extended day school enrichment activities will increase student learning opportunities. Parents will
 have access to classes such as computer classes, English as a Second Language classes, college and career
 awareness, and extended library hours.
- Provide operational flexibility and sustained support (Federal Statutory Requirement 21.1) A
 Bilingual Specialist will join the team to coach teachers and assist with bilingual instruction. A math, reading and science coach for each grade level will coach teachers on how to effectively use data disaggregation to drive instruction.

To identify the needs of Bobby Shaw Middle School, campus staff and district leadership will be involved in a comprehensive needs assessment. The process will begin within one month of the grant award and data specific to the campus will include:

- · Demographic data;
- · Student academic achievement data;
- · School culture and climate data:
- · Staff quality and retention data;
- · Curriculum, instruction, and assessment data;
- · Family and community involvement data;
- · School context and organization data; and
- Technology data.

Data collection: Collection of the data above will come from the data sources listed on page 17 by the Director of Research and Evaluation, campus administration, Associate Superintendents, and the campus-based grant manager. Data collection will occur within two months of the grant award and it will be formatted to identify trends and relationships.

Stakeholder input: The Director of Research and Evaluation, campus administration, Associate Superintendents, and the campus based grant manager will lead stakeholder meetings and conduct surveys. Stakeholder meetings and surveys will occur within three months of receiving the grant award and include community (local area industry, institutes of higher education, and the City of Pasadena), parents, students, teachers, the Superintendent, Associate Superintendents, and campus leadership.

Data evaluation: By the end of the third month of the grant award, the data and stakeholder input will be evaluated and school improvement priorities will be established.

Identifying the model and finalizing the plan design: Within four months of the grant award, the Bobby Shaw design team⁵ will visit schools that have implemented successful school improvement reforms. The model will be identified and the plan design will be finalized and aligned to the district's strategic plan, using the needs assessment data, and information gained from site visits to successful school improvement districts. Pasadena Independent School District values the opportunities that grant funds provide and recognizes that grants allow the district to laser focus on instructional/learning gaps. Thus, the Board of Trustees supports district and campus use of grant funds and assures district resources of accounting, payroll, purchasing, and over-site are available to assure federal and state compliance. This will occur through the following supports:

Superintendent support: The superintendent will guide his administrative team in assuring the school-based program implementation maintains the direction and focus of the district's strategic plan. He will also help problem-solve resource needs and assure that the Board of Trustees is informed of program progress and accomplishments.

Associate Superintendent support: The campus will work with an Associate Superintendent of Campus Development and an Associate Superintendent of Curriculum and Instruction. Both will assure that program implementation will stay and remain aligned to the district improvement plan and the district strategic plan.

Grant Department: The grant department will guide Bobby Shaw Middle in assuring that all State and Federal grant requirements are met. It will provide pre-implementation training, help with progress reports and meeting report deadlines, and assuring that all program activities described in the grant proposal are completed.

Finance Department: The finance department will provide a grant accountant to oversee the fiscal stewardship of all grant funds. The accountant will assure the grant funds are always separate from other district funds, that all state and federal requirements are met, and that all financial reports are completed and submitted on time. In addition, the finance department will assure that the internal auditor evaluates grant fund usage. This will assure that the program grant manager is following the applications describe use of all grant funds.

Payroll: The payroll department will be responsible for assuring the grant funded positions are paid according to the grant application description.

Department of Instructional Technology: The department of instructional technology will support teachers in integrating technology into instruction and helping all teachers reach the 'Target Tech' level of instruction- the highest level of technology integration as evidenced by the Texas Campus and Teacher School Technology and Readiness (STaR) chart. In addition, the campus-based technology liaison will use the STaR chart to identify resources to address gaps in technology integration in classroom instruction.

Department of Technology: The department of technology will support Bobby Shaw Middle School in assuring that technology is properly installed and functional.

Campus: The campus will assure that a team will attend and participate in grant orientation meetings, technical assistance meetings, periodic meetings of grantees, the Texas School Improvement Conference, and the sharing of best practices that will support and guide school improvement implementation.

Although the comprehensive needs assessment is not complete and the intervention has not been selected, Bobby Shaw Middle School is anticipating that it will modify its practices and policies to align with the requirements of the transformation model. The following modifications will guide the staff and leadership at Bobby Shaw Middle School:

- Develop and increase teacher and school leader effectiveness (Federal Statutory Requirement 21.1)

 Leadership will be the first focus of increasing whole school improvement. An external provider will guide
 Shaw in assessing school leadership skills, gaps, and adapt a program of coaching responsive to the needs of the leadership team. Existing campus grade level math, reading, and science peer facilitators and newly hired content specialists for math, reading, and science will receive additional training on how to use data from campus-based and teacher-designed assessments to address identified gaps and weaknesses. The three content area specialists will work with each teacher, individually, on using the data to drive instruction and coach the teachers on strategies to address areas of need. Job-embedded professional development will train teachers to design lessons that are tied to the Student Expectations. Additionally, through the specialist's expertise, teachers will learn to develop content assessments that identify students who need small group instruction and learn to adjust instruction, if necessary.
- Comprehensive instructional reform strategies (Federal Statutory Requirement 21.1) The reading, math and science curriculum will undergo auditing, revision, and alignment for both grade levels. The content specialists will guide the curriculum revisions. Collaboration with external experts for science and math strategies will provide additional content for the curriculum and additional activities for implementation in the classroom. The Specialists will coach teachers to use the new aligned curriculum at the level in which student achievement meets the TEKS Student Expectations. Coaches will also aid teachers to use data to make effective instructional decisions. Teacher teaming will be used to respond to students' needs quickly. Each team will have four core teachers that have a common planning period. Teachers will also have a common planning period to meet as a department and to align instruction vertically. Teacher collaboration across content areas and grade levels will allow teachers to use strategies that have proven effective in addressing the areas of highest academic need. Student peer tutoring will be used to promote peer-to-peer learning, which studies have shown increases academic achievement and improves social skills.⁶ Finally, each teacher will engage in student-led conferences allowing students to discuss their performance with their parents and teacher.
- Increase learning time and create community-oriented schools (Federal Statutory Requirement 21.1) Students attending Bobby Shaw Middle School will have a menu of options to address learning beyond the school day. The options include a zero period, afterschool program, and a summer program. Zero hour will allow students to take a class, for credit, before the regular school day begins. Success of school-wide reform depends in part on engaging parents and the community in school activities. Activities offered for parents and the community will include computer classes, English as a Second Language classes, college and career awareness, and extended library hours.
- Provide operational flexibility and sustained support (Federal Statutory Requirement 21.1) The campus will hire a Masters-level program manager for all TTIPS grant activities. A Bilingual Specialist will also join the team to coach teachers and assist with bilingual instruction. A math, reading and science coach for each grade level will work with teachers as a resource and coach to assist with data disaggregation conversations and usage that determine student academic needs.

Using existing Bobby Shaw Middle School resources will enhance and support the transformation school improvement model planned by allowing Shaw to align current resources with school improvement interventions and strengthen the impact of the model on student performance. In addition to the campus teachers and support staff, the resources below will align with the transformation model:

Safe and Civil Schools - This framework provides the campus with resources for behavior and classroom management. The principles and procedures of this approach change the school climate reducing misbehavior and increasing student engagement using Positive Behavior Supports.

Communities in Schools - The nation's largest dropout prevention organization provides services to at-risk youth and their parents. A full-time staff person facilitates the activities based on the needs of the students and families.

Pasadena I.S.D. Strategic Plan - The district is committed to improving all areas from strengthening leadership to improving student academic success. The Pasadena I.S.D. strategic planning committee's vision and goals are in alignment with Bobby Shaw Middle School's school-wide literacy initiative.

D.A.T.E. Grant – To recognize teachers and staff who have gone beyond regular instructional practices to reach an academic goal on the TAKS test and complete supportive activities, the D.A.T.E. grant provides financial incentive awards. Each calculated goal includes an Academic Growth Requirement as an added "stretch" for the team.

Conscious Discipline - In this research-based classroom management program and social-emotional curriculum, teachers are transformed, first. Eventually, their new perspective leads to change for the students they touch. Students are able to manage daily tasks such as learning, forming relationships, effective communications, being aware of their peer's needs and working well with others.

21st Century Community Learning Center - During the after-school hours, children have a safe place to remain at Bobby Shaw Middle School. Students engage in sewing, soccer, computers, board games, arts and crafts, homework help, basketball, and volleyball. The program is open to any student Monday through Thursday.

Computers and Promethean Boards - Bobby Shaw Middle School has 171 student computers and 52 interactive whiteboards. Interactive whiteboards allow content on a computer screen to be projected on a display that students can interact with during instruction to meet the needs of the 21st Century learners that are in each class.

Instructional Specialists for Math, Reading and Science - The Reading and Math Peer Facilitators and the Science Specialist will continue to use assessment data to help teachers and the leadership make effective instructional decisions campus-wide. Specialists assist the teachers with interpreting assessment data down to the individual student in each class and coach teachers on strategies that will address gaps and weaknesses.

Kids 2 College - Kids to College is a college awareness curriculum for 6th grade students with a culminating activity of visiting a local university. Parents also receive a workbook informing them of the many options that exist to prepare and send their child to college.

Pasadena Independent School District will assure that Bobby Shaw Middle School has a campus-based grant program manager whose sole responsibility is to support the campus' school improvement efforts. The structure that PISD will build to support the campus-based intervention will include:

- 1). Capacity: Pasadena I.S.D.'s goal is to assure school improvement activities are implemented with fidelity. PISD will build the capacity to meet this goal by:
 - Using an external provider to guide school improvement activity implementation.
 - Training all staff on program requirements and school improvement activities.
 - Creating a management organizational chart that delineates roles and responsibilities.
 - Assigning a grant accountant who will assure the grant funds are used according to the grant description and federal and state requirements,
 - Assigning a grant official to provide grant implementation training, review of grant requirements, and support and assist with grant progress reports.
 - Recruiting and hiring a qualified grant program manager that will handle the day-to-day operational responsibilities and coordinate school improvement activities.
 - Establishing a system of checks and balances to assure all aspects of the school improvement program are implemented, operational, and effective. Establish a system for modifying program components if desired outcomes are not occurring

The school improvement model and program design implementation will be supported through this grant for one year of planning and two years of implementation. This timeframe will allow Bobby Shaw Middle School to re-organize and integrate new operational, instructional, and school culture strategies by building an infrastructure of processes and procedures.

Though all of the strategies and activities will not be defined until the needs assessment is complete, it is expected that minimally, the following activities will occur and will continue beyond the grant year, without additional funding:

- · An assessment process to identify campus instructional leadership skills and abilities,
- · A coaching process developing instructional leadership skills,
- · An assessment process to identify teacher skills and abilities,
- · A coaching process for developing classroom instruction skills and abilities,
- · A process for auditing and revising the curriculum, and training teachers to use it,
- A menu of 300 additional hours of student educational opportunities outside of the regular school day,
- · Instruction driven by data from all student assessments,
- Instructional resources that are matched to the depth of instruction needed to respond to the TEKS-Student Expectations,
- · An embedded system of college and career awareness and readiness activities for students and parents,
- Reading Night at apartment complexes that feed into the school,
- Student peer tutors for each grade level.

School improvement model activities requiring continued funding:

- Four campus content specialists (reading, math, and science coaches, and the bilingual specialist),
- · Teachers for zero hour classes and after-school program,
- · College visits.

The staffing that need continued funding beyond the grant year are positions that support the goals of the district's long-range strategic plan. Thus, it is expected that if the program components have resulted in significant improvement, the district will continue them.

Pasadena I.S.D. has experience in using external providers in the school improvement process. Therefore, it has experience in recruiting, screening, and selecting providers who understand the district, are responsive to the instructional and organizational gaps, and are willing to work with the district's resources.

Recruit: First, the scope of work will be released to our known external providers and to the public and to accept proposals for providing the services. The scope of work will include the following:

- 1. School Profile Visit—The profile will identify trends in student performance over time, and where possible, present school data and performance compared to similar schools and state averages. Data areas for review include student achievement data, student participation data, student subgroup data, demographic data, student/parent surveys, and school characteristics to identify strengths and potential areas of need. In addition to the district's current data sources, information collected includes, but is not limited to, Grade 5-6 standardized test results, achievement levels on standardized tests/assessments other than state exams, yearly growth in literacy, student participation in enrichment courses (music, art, physical education, etc.), student satisfaction surveys, student risk behaviors, additional data indicators pertinent to Pasadena I.S.D., and staff surveys to determine general attitudes about the working environment.
- **2. Instructional Review**—Conducting classroom observations, teacher interviews, and teacher surveys, to understand classroom instruction. Evaluation of curriculum maps will assure the standards—State, College, and National are evident and present in Pasadena I.S.D. curriculum.
- **3. School Improvement Planning and Model Selection**—Guiding campus and district staff in selecting a school improvement model, identifying improvement activities, and developing an implementation plan.
 - 4. Staff development-Modeling on leadership and instructional best practices and on relationship building.
- 5. Job-embedded executive coaching for school positional leaders/principal and school leadership teams—Demonstrating use of the observational walk-through for teacher development and instruct on being an effective instructional leader.
 - 6. Job-embedded coaching for teachers—Guidance on using best-practices in the classroom
- 7. Parent and Community partnership development guidance—Training on supporting student academic achievement

Using the results from the comprehensive needs assessment (Statutory Requirement #1), the Bobby Shaw Middle School planning committee will identify the areas that require the most improvement. The committee is comprised of the School Principal, Associate Superintendent of Curriculum and Instruction, Associate Superintendent of Campus Development, teacher representative, Technical Assistance provider, and the Department of Research and Evaluation. Referring to the critical areas as a guide, the committee will develop activities under the Transformation Model for Bobby Shaw Middle School. To adequately address the needs of the campus (Statutory Requirement #21) as determined by the needs assessment, the committee will evaluate the four pieces of the model. They are:

- · developing and increasing teacher and school leader effectiveness,
- implementing comprehensive instructional reform strategies,
- · increasing learning time and creating community-oriented schools and,
- · providing operational flexibility and sustained support.

Research conducted by the members of the planning committee will produce a list of schools in the state that have the same areas of need, the same student demographics, and are currently implementing a school reform model to address the critical areas. A member of the planning committee will contact selected campuses. The committee will then present the additional findings to the committee. After discussing all information for the selected campuses, the committee will decide the campuses to visit. Committee members will visit no more than six schools throughout the year.

Bobby Shaw Middle School anticipates the needs assessment will reflect several areas that will require transformation. The areas expected to require improvements include:

- strategies to increase teacher and leadership effectiveness, such as the implementation of new observation protocols (Federal Statutory Requirement #21, 1B.1),
- increase college and career awareness, (Federal Statutory Requirement #23, E1),
- increase learning time through an extension of the school day (Federal Statutory Requirement #21, 3A) and,
- adding more job-embedded professional development as a regular part of the school year (Federal Statutory Requirement #21, D).

Visiting a middle school that is currently implementing a school improvement model and has similar demographics will provide insight for successful implementation of the transformation model at Bobby Shaw Middle School. The committee will consider such factors, in addition to areas that are prominent in the needs assessment, as the site visits are determined.

After visiting the selected campuses, the committee expects to learn about strategies that are successful and unsuccessful in school improvement reform and will be able to apply those lessons learned in the implementation plan for Bobby Shaw Middle School. Research shows that schools that perform well are constantly refining their processes. Throughout the three years of the grant, the committee will visit and explore successful practices from around the state. The expectation is that each visit will produce a new way to modify our plan to yield the best possible results for the students.

MODEL SELECTION PROCESS.

- **1. Complete a comprehensive needs assessment.** A comprehensive needs assessment will guide the model selection and program plan development.
- 2. Complete site visits to schools with successful school improvement models. Site visits will allow Bobby Shaw Middle School to take lessons learned from existing middle school reform models and implement them district-wide.

PROGRAM DESIGN:

The expectation is that Bobby Shaw Middle will use the Tier III Transformation Model. If this school improvement model is selected, staff will develop a plan for implementing program strategies, establishing the baselines for newly identified indicators, and refining the one and two year program goals. The plan will be based on the four principles of TEA's model of transformation that include: improving student achievement and increasing college and career readiness by building the capacity of campus leaders and teachers; reforming instructional strategies in all grade levels and content areas; increasing opportunities for learning outside of the regular school day; and utilizing district support to transform operational systems.

While the specific details of the ongoing monitoring and continuous improvement will be defined during Year One, during the needs assessment process, the following will discuss the process that will be used to assure program fidelity.

The external evaluator will create protocols, spreadsheets and databases that will be used to track and maintain process data. An implementation team, consisting of the principal, project manager, curriculum specialist, parents, and the Associate Superintendent, will insure implementation fidelity by monthly review of the evaluators process data and grant objectives that will center around (1) development of teacher and leadership effectiveness, (2) the use of the comprehensive instructional reform activities, (3) the use and effectiveness of increased learning time. Data on progress or non-progress will be used for feedback. The implementation team will be the venue for identifying program implementation problems, problem-solving program problems, and continuous improvement.

The external evaluator will participate in monthly conference calls to review grant management, program delivery following timelines, and problem solving implementation. Monitoring will include: (1) development of teacher and leadership effectiveness, (2) the use of the comprehensive instructional reform activities, (3) the use and effectiveness of increased learning time.

Bobby Shaw Middle and Pasadena Independent School District will allow TEA site visits and will support TEA in securing any evaluation and program information requested.8

Until the final plan is developed, the specific activities that are monitored for the formative evaluation cannot be defined. However, in general, these following areas will be monitored and the process described will be followed.

Formative evaluation will begin with the grant award and will focus on monitoring grant activities to assure that they are implemented with fidelity and according to the timeline. In addition, the formative evaluation will provide the data that will alert the planning committee that a program strategy or activity is not advancing toward the desired outcome and will require problem-solving.

The formative evaluation will track the following activities:

- The administrator leadership skills and abilities are assessed and skill gaps were identified.
- Administrator leadership gap remedies are identified and implemented.
- Remedy activities will be documented and assessed for effectiveness.
- The number of observational walkthroughs completed will be documented and evaluated.
- The use of observational walkthrough data will be documented and evaluated.
- The coaching will be documented and evaluated.
- The number of lesson plans that integrate technology will be identified, documented, and evaluated.
- The number of collaborative teaching meetings and vertical meetings scheduled and teacher attendance will be documented and evaluated.
- The data disaggregation activities will be documented and evaluated.
- The math, reading/ELA, and science curriculum alignment to State, National, and Texas College Readiness standards will be evaluated for completion, fidelity, and use.
- The number of college awareness activities will be identified and effectiveness and attendance will be evaluated.
- The parent and community involvement will be identified and evaluated.
- The use and effectiveness of the literacy coaches and content specialists will be identified and evaluated.
- The student disciplinary actions will be tracked, monitored, and evaluated.
- The use of data to drive instruction will be documented and evaluated.
- The number of enrichment and parent and community activities that result in extended school day activities will be tracked and evaluated.

This process will allow Bobby Shaw Middle to provide evidence of a system of formative assessment aligned to the Texas Essential Knowledge and Skills which provides robust, targeted data to evaluate the effectiveness of the district's curriculum and its alignment with instruction occurring on the campus; assesses progress on student groups' academic achievement at the campus level; and quide instructional decisions by teachers for individual students.

Bobby Shaw Middle will, through this assessment process, provide a formative assessment of its capacity and commitment to carry out the grant intervention models. Bobby Shaw Middle will also provide access for onsite visits by TEA and its contractors.

Data collection methods to evaluate the Bobby Shaw Middle program will be aligned to its objectives and performance measures. External evaluation staff will work with the implementation team to collect data. Qualitative and quantitative <u>process</u> performance measures will be documented continuously using: meeting minutes, checklists, sign-in sheets, and excel spreadsheets and qualitative and quantitative <u>outcome</u> performance measures will be documented by using the following data collection methods:

Quantitative methods (1) online and scanable surveys (developed by evaluator) administered at baseline, midterm, and end of the project to students (satisfaction and attitudes towards regular and extended school day activities), teachers (satisfaction and usefulness of trainings, increase in confidence and ability to differentiate instruction based on data disaggregation) and administrators (satisfaction and usefulness of trainings), (2) trend analysis of annual reviews of AEIS reports and school records for scores on TAKS and other end of year standardized tests (student achievement) and (3) trend analysis of supplemental diagnostic tests.

<u>Qualitative methods</u>: Annually, evaluation staff will conduct interviews with a minimum of 10% of the teachers and administrators asking about their satisfaction with program delivery and possible changes resulting from the program.

The quantitative data will be analyzed using descriptive statistics and repeated measures for change over time with SPSS software. Qualitative content analysis will be conducted on transcriptions of interviews and examination of comments for themes.

The process followed to determine the performance goals for Bobby Shaw Middle School will involve research of best practices, creation of goals based on proven strategies, ongoing review of goals, and revision of goals, as needed. Meetings will take place with a the planning committee, which includes the School Principal, Associate Superintendent of Curriculum and Instruction, Grant Manager, teacher representative, Technical Assistance provider, and the Department of Research and Evaluation. During the initial meeting, the committee will identify target areas of need as a result of the campus needs assessment. The committee will use the Critical Success Factors (CSF) as a guide for developing appropriate performance goals that are realistic and achievable. Using the information from the needs assessment will also help the committee identify specific milestones for each CSF. For each CSF, the committee will consider the following strategies for inclusion in the model as milestones are developed:

- Improve Academic Performance, including (but not limited to) Reading/ELA and Math (Federal Statutory Requirement #21,)- Curriculum alignment for all grade levels to the TEKS Student Expectations and the college readiness standards, vertically and horizontally. Implementation of a literacy initiative across all subject levels, with the use of instructional coaches, which includes a writing component and sustained silent reading.
- Increase the Use of Quality Data to Drive Instruction (Federal Statutory Requirement #21, 2) Training for teachers on how to use data to make instructional decisions in the classroom and to audit the resources for true alignment. Use data to determine the most effective professional development workshops to offer that will address areas of weakness.
- Increase Leadership Effectiveness (Federal Statutory Requirement #21,1) The Associate Superintendents for Campus Development will work with the principal to develop an additional assessment tool to measure leadership team effectiveness, including principal self-evaluations.
- **Increase Learning Time** (Federal Statutory Requirement #21,3) Extending the regular school day in various ways that include implementing an afterschool enrichment programs and increasing the capacity of current programs such as 21st Century Community Learning Centers.
- Increase Parent/Community Involvement (Federal Statutory Requirement #21,3) Conduct campus events that expose parents to college and career awareness. The campus will engage an institute of higher learning to disseminate information about careers, college affordability, and college preparation at parent events. Local businesses will also contribute information on careers during the events. Offer computer, ESL and GED classes for parents.
- **Improve School Climate** (Federal Statutory Requirement #21,4A) Implementing the strategies in Safe and Civil Schools to foster improved behavioral and classroom management.
- Increase Teacher Quality (Federal Statutory Requirement #21,1D) Increase the opportunities for staff members to participate in job-embedded professional development and the placement of content specific instructional coaches and literacy coaches. The planning committee will take each of the CSFs and determine what activities under each CSF will support the areas of the transformation model and address the needs of the campus. After the activities have been identified, each activity will have a performance indicator created to measure the success of the implemented activity on student achievement. A baseline for each performance indicator determined using the current year's performance will serve as an initial guide for determining the actual goals for

- A. Terms defined: As used in these Provisions and Assurances,
 - Contract means the entire document, and all of TEA's attachments, appendices, schedules (including but not limited to the General Provisions and the Special Provisions), amendments and extensions of or to the Standard Contract;
 - Agency or TEA means the Texas Education Agency;
 - Contractor means the party or parties to this contract other than Agency; including its or their officers, directors, employees, agents, representatives, consultants and subcontractors, and subcontractors' officers, directors, employees, agents, representatives and consultants;
 - Project Administrator means the person representing Agency or Contractor, as indicated by the contract, for the purposes of administering the contract project:
 - Contract Project means the purpose intended to be achieved through the contract of which these Provisions and Assurances are a part;
 - Applicant means the same as Contractor;
 - · SAS means the Standard Application System of which the application document is a part;
 - "Application" means the entire package submitted by the Applicant including the schedules contained in the application and so indicated on the General Information page of the application package;
 - Amendment means an application that is revised in budget categories and/or in program activities. It includes both the
 original application and any subsequent amendments; or extensions thereto;
 - Works means all tangible or intangible material, products, ideas, documents or works of authorship prepared or created by Contractor for or on behalf of TEA at any time after the beginning date of the Contract (Works includes but is not limited to computer software, data, information, images, illustrations, designs, graphics, drawings, educational materials, assessment forms, testing materials, logos, trademarks, patentable materials, etc.); and,
 - Intellectual Property Rights means the worldwide intangible legal rights or interests evidenced by or embodied in: (a) any idea, design, concept, method, process, technique, apparatus, invention, discovery, or improvement, including any patents, trade secrets, and know-how; (b) any work of authorship, including any copyrights, moral rights or neighboring rights; (c) any trademark, service mark, trade dress, trade name, or other indicia of source or origin; (d) domain name registrations; and (e) any other similar rights. The Intellectual Property Rights of a party include all worldwide intangible legal rights or interests that the party may have acquired by assignment or license with the right to grant sublicenses.
 - Grant means the same as Contract;
 - Grantee means the same as Contractor;
 - · Grantor means the same as Agency; and
 - DCC means the Document Control Center of Agency.
- **B.** Contingency: This contract is executed by Agency subject to the availability of funds appropriated by legislative act for the purposes stated. All amendments and/or extensions or subsequent contracts entered into for the same or continued purposes are executed contingent upon the availability of appropriated funds. Notwithstanding any other provision in this contract or any other document, this contract is void upon appropriated funds becoming unavailable. In addition, this contract may be terminated by Agency at any time for any reason upon notice to Contractor. Expenditures and/or activities for which Contractor may claim reimbursement shall not be accrued or claimed subsequent to receipt of such notice from Agency. This contract may be extended or otherwise amended only by formal written amendment properly executed by both Agency and Contractor. No other agreement, written or oral, purporting to alter or amend this contract shall be valid.
- C. Contractor's Application: Furnished to Agency in response to a request for application, is incorporated in this contract by reference for all necessary purposes. It is specifically provided, however, that the provisions of this contract shall prevail in all cases of conflict arising from the terms of Contractor's application whether such application is a written part of this contract or is attached as a separate document.
- D. Requirements, Terms, Conditions, and Assurances: Which are stated in the Request for Application, in response to which Applicant is submitting this application, are incorporated herein by reference for all purposes although the current General Provisions shall prevail in the event of conflict. The instructions to the Standard Application System, as well as the General and Fiscal Guidelines and Program Guidelines, are incorporated herein by reference.

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- E. Signature Authority; Final Expression; Superseding Document: Applicant certifies that the person signing this application has been properly delegated this authority. The Contract represents the final and complete expression of the terms of agreement between the parties. The Contract supersedes any previous understandings or negotiations between the parties. Any representations, oral statements, promises or warranties that differ from the Contract shall have no force or effect. The Contract may be modified, amended or extended only by formal written amendment properly executed by both TEA and Contractor.
- **F. State of Texas Laws:** In the conduct of the contract project, Contractor shall be subject to Texas State Board of Education and Commissioner rules pertaining to this contract and the contract project and to the laws of the State of Texas governing this contract and the contract project. This contract constitutes the entire agreement between Agency and Contractor for the accomplishment of the contract project. This contract shall be interpreted according to the laws of the State of Texas except as may be otherwise provided for in this contract.
- **G. Monitoring**: Desk reviews or on-site monitoring reviews may be conducted by Agency to determine compliance with the approved application and the applicable statute(s), law(s), regulations, and guidelines.
- H. Sanctions for Failure to Perform or for Noncompliance: If Contractor, in Agency's sole determination, fails or refuses for any reason to comply with or perform any of its obligations under this contract, Agency may impose such sanctions as it may deem appropriate. This includes but is not limited to the withholding of payments to Contractor until Contractor complies; the cancellation, termination, or suspension of this contract in whole or in part; and the seeking of other remedies as may be provided by this contract or by law. Any cancellation, termination, or suspension of this contract, if imposed, shall become effective at the close of business on the day of Contractor's receipt of written notice thereof from Agency.
- I. Contract Cancellation, etc.: If this contract is canceled, terminated, or suspended by Agency prior to its expiration date, the reasonable monetary value of services properly performed by Contractor pursuant to this contract prior to such cancellation, termination or suspension shall be determined by Agency and paid to Contractor as soon as reasonably possible.
- J. Indemnification:

For local educational agencies (LEAs), regional education service centers (ESCs), and institutions of higher education (IHEs) and state agencies: Contractor, to the extent permitted by law, shall hold Agency harmless from and shall indemnify Agency against any and all claims, demands, and causes of action of whatever kind or nature asserted by any third party and occurring or in any way incident to, arising from, or in connection with, any acts of Contractor, its agents, employees, and subcontractors, done in the conduct of the contract project.

For all other grantees, subgrantees, contractors, and subcontractors, including nonprofit organizations and forprofit businesses: Contractor shall hold Agency harmless from and shall indemnify Agency against any and all claims, demands, and causes of action of whatever kind or nature asserted by any third party and occurring or in any way incident to, arising from, or in connection with, any acts of Contractor, its agents, employees, and subcontractors, done in the conduct of the contract project.

K. Encumbrances/Obligations and Liquidations: All encumbrances/obligations shall occur on or between the beginning and ending dates of the contract. All goods must be received and all services rendered between the beginning and ending dates of the contract. The contractor must liquidate (record as an expenditure) all obligations (encumbrances) incurred under the contract no later than 30 days after the ending date of the contract, to coincide with the submission of the final expenditure report, due 30 days after the ending date of the contract. In no manner shall encumbrances be considered or reflected as accounts payable or as expenditures, and an encumbrance cannot be considered an expenditure or accounts payable until the goods have been received and the services have been rendered. Obligations that are liquidated and recognized as expenditures must meet the allowable cost principles in OMB Circular A-87, A-21, or A-122 (as applicable) and program rules, regulations, and guidelines contained elsewhere. This applies to all grant programs, including state and federal, discretionary and formula.

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- L. Financial Management and Accounting: Grantee assures it will maintain a financial management system that complies with federal standards established in 34 CFR 80.20 and 74.21 and that provides for accurate, current, and complete disclosure of the financial results of each grant project. The financial management system records will identify adequately the source and application of funds and will contain information pertaining to grant awards, authorizations, obligations, unobligated balances, assets, outlays (i.e., expenditures), income, and interest. Fiscal control and accounting procedures will permit the tracing of funds to a level of expenditure adequate to establish that funds have been used in accordance with the approved grant application. The applicant agrees to maintain effective control over and accountability for all funds, property, and other assets. Public school districts, open enrollment charter schools, and regional education service centers in Texas must comply with the accounting requirements in the Financial Accounting and Reporting (FAR) module of the Financial Accountability System Resource Guide, Texas Education Agency (34 CFR 74.21; 34 CFR 80.20; TEA Financial Accountability System Resource Guide).
- M. Expenditure Reports: Contractor shall submit expenditure reports in the time and manner requested by Agency as specified in the instructions to the Standard Application System (SAS) which are incorporated by reference. Unless otherwise specified, interim reports are due to TEA within 15 days after the end of each reporting period. Unless otherwise specified, the final expenditure report is due within 30 days after the ending date of the grant. Revised expenditure reports, where the grantee is claiming additional expenditures beyond that originally requested, must be submitted within 60 days after the ending date of the grant, or as specified in the applicable Program Guidelines.
- N. Refunds Due to TEA: If Agency determines that Agency is due a refund of money paid to Contractor pursuant to this contract, Contractor shall pay the money due to Agency within 30 days of Contractor's receipt of written notice that such money is due to Agency. If Contractor fails to make timely payment, Agency may obtain such money from Contractor by any means permitted by law, including but not limited to offset, counterclaim, cancellation, termination, suspension, total withholding, and/or disapproval of all or any subsequent applications for said funds.
- O. Records Retention: Contractor shall maintain its records and accounts in a manner which shall assure a full accounting for all funds received and expended by Contractor in connection with the contract project. These records and accounts shall be retained by Contractor and made available for programmatic or financial audit by Agency and by others authorized by law or regulation to make such an audit for a period of not less than five years from the date of completion of the contract project or the date of the receipt by Agency of Contractor's final claim for payment or final expenditure report in connection with this contract, whichever is later. If an audit has been announced, the records shall be retained until such audit has been completed.
 - Contractor understands that acceptance of funds under this contract acts as acceptance of the authority of the State Auditor's office, or any successor agency, to conduct an audit or investigation in connection with those funds. Contractor further agrees to cooperate fully with the State Auditor's Office or its successor in the conduct of the audit or investigation, including providing all records requested. Contractor will ensure that this clause concerning the authority to audit funds received indirectly by subcontractors through Contractor and the requirements to cooperate is included in any subcontract it awards.
- P. Time and Effort Recordkeeping: For those personnel whose salaries are prorated between or among different funding sources, time and effort records will be maintained by Applicant that will confirm the services provided within each funding source. Applicant must adjust payroll records and expenditures based on this documentation. This requirement applies to all projects, regardless of funding source, unless otherwise specified. For federally funded projects, time and effort records must be in accordance with the requirements in the applicable OMB cost principles.
- **Q. Forms, Assurances, and Reports:** Contractor shall timely make and file with the proper authorities all forms, assurances and reports required by federal laws and regulations. Agency shall be responsible for reporting to the proper authorities any failure by Contractor to comply with the foregoing laws and regulations coming to Agency's attention, and may deny payment or recover payments made by Agency to Contractor in the event of Contractor's failure so to comply.

Compliance with this provision will be enforced through rules and orders issued by the Office for Civil Rights. If the public school or agency does not comply with the rules or orders, no funds made available through the Department of Education shall be provided by a school that fails to comply with such rules or orders or to any agency or school served by an agency that fails to comply with such rules or orders (P. L. 107-110, section 9525).
- P.  - (F) complies with the Age Discrimination Act of 1975, Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972, section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, and Part B of the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act;
 - (G) is a school to which parents choose to send their children, and that admits students on the basis of a lottery, if more students apply for admission than can be accommodated;
 - (H) agrees to comply with the same Federal and State audit requirements as do other elementary schools and secondary schools in the State, unless such requirements are specifically waived for the purpose of this program;
 - (I) meets all applicable Federal, State, and local health and safety requirements;
 - (J) operates in accordance with State law; and
 - (K) has a written performance contract with the authorized public chartering agency in the State (i.e., SBOE) that includes a description of how student performance will be measured pursuant to State assessments that are required of other schools and pursuant to any other assessments mutually agreeable to the SBOE.
 - 2. **Community-Based Organization**: A public or private nonprofit organization of demonstrated effectiveness that is representative of a community or significant segment of a community and that provides educational or related services to individuals in the community.
 - 3. Core Academic Subjects: English, reading or language arts, mathematics, science, foreign languages, civics and government, economics, art, history, and geography.

NCLB ACT PROVISIONS & ASSURANCES

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4. Highly Qualified:

- (A) when used with respect to any public elementary school or secondary school teacher teaching in a State, means that—
 - (i) the teacher has obtained full State certification as a teacher (including certification obtained through alternative routes to certification) or passed the State teacher licensing examination, and holds a license to teach in such State, except that when used with respect to any teacher teaching in a public charter school, the term means that the teacher meets the requirements set forth in the State's public charter school law; and

 - (ii) a middle or secondary school teacher who is new to the profession, means that the teacher holds at least a bachelor's degree and has demonstrated a high level of competency in each of the academic subjects in which the teacher teaches by-
 - passing a rigorous State academic subject test in each of the academic subjects in which the teacher teaches (which may consist of a passing level of performance on a State-required certification or licensing test or tests in each of the academic subjects in which the teacher teaches); or
 - (II) successful completion, in each of the academic subjects in which the teacher teaches, of an academic major, a graduate degree, coursework equivalent to an undergraduate academic major, or advanced certification or credentialing; and
- (C) when used with respect to an elementary, middle, or secondary school teacher who is not new to the profession, means that the teacher holds at least a bachelor's degree and-
 - (i) has met the applicable standard in clause (i) or (ii) of subparagraph (B), which includes an option for a test; or
 - (ii) demonstrates competence in all the academic subjects in which the teacher teaches based on a high objective uniform State standard of evaluation that—
 - is set by the State for both grade appropriate academic subject matter knowledge and teaching skills;
 - (II) is aligned with challenging State academic content and student academic achievement standards and developed in consultation with core content specialists, teachers, principals, and school administrators;
 - (III) provides objective, coherent information about the teacher's attainment of core content knowledge in the academic subjects in which a teacher teaches;
 - (IV) is applied uniformly to all teachers in the same academic subject and the same grade level throughout the State;
 - takes into consideration, but not be based primarily on, the time the teacher has been teaching in the academic subject;
 - (VI) is made available to the public upon request; and
 - (VII) may involve multiple, objective measures of teacher competency.
- 5. Parental Involvement: The participation of parents in regular, two-way and meaningful communication involving student academic learning and other school activities, including ensuring:
 - (A) that parents play an integral role in assisting their child's learning;
 - (B) that parents are encouraged to be actively involved in their child's education at school;
 - (C) that parents are full partners in their child's education and are included, as appropriate, in decision making and on advisory committees to assist in the education of their child; and
 - (D) the carrying out of other activities, such as those described in section 1118 of P. L. 107-110.

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6. Professional Development includes activities that:

- (A) improve and increase teachers' knowledge of the academic subjects the teachers teach, and enable teachers to become highly qualified;
- (B) are an integral part of broad schoolwide and districtwide educational improvement plans;
- (C) give teachers, principals, and administrators the knowledge and skills to provide the students with the opportunity to meet challenging State academic content standards and student academic achievement standards;
- (D) improve classroom management skills;
- (E) are high quality, sustained, intensive, and classroom-focused in order to have a positive and lasting impact on classroom instruction and the teacher's performance in the classroom and are not one-day or short-term workshops or conferences;
- (F) support the recruiting, hiring, and training of highly qualified teachers, including teachers who became highly qualified through State and local alternative routes to certification;
- (G) advance teacher understanding of effective instructional strategies that are:
- (H) based on scientifically based research (except for programs under Title II, Part D, Enhancing Education Through Technology of this Act); and
- strategies for improving student academic achievement or substantially increasing the knowledge and teaching skills of teachers; and
- (J) are aligned with and directly related to State academic content standards, student academic achievement standards, and assessments and the curricula and programs tied to the standards;

1. **Separate Tracking and Monitoring of ARRA Funds**: ARRA funds must be separately tracked and monitored independently of any non-Recovery Act funding. Grantees must submit certain information to TEA in order for TEA to comply with quarterly reporting requirements established in Section 1512 of the Recovery Act. Recovery Act-related reporting requirements are incorporated as a special condition of this award.

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- 3. Quarterly Reporting for ARRA: Not later than 10 calendar days after the end of each calendar quarter, TEA and any other direct recipient of ARRA funds must report to the U.S. Department of Education with regard to recovery funds received in accordance with number 4 below (Section 1512[c]). (A "direct recipient" is a state agency or any entity that applies for and receives funds directly from a federal government agency.) TEA must obtain certain information from grantees in order to comply with this reporting requirement. By submitting this application, the grantee agrees to submit information to TEA in the time, form, and manner requested.
- 4. **Data Elements for Quarterly Reporting for ARRA**: In accordance with Section 1512(c) of ARRA and the <u>Federal Funding Accountability and Transparency Act of 2006 (Public Law 109-282)</u>, TEA is required to provide quarterly reports to the U.S. Department of Education or through a central government-wide portal (http://www.FederalReporting.gov). The information adopted by OMB contains the following data elements: submitting this application, the grantee agrees to submit the information to TEA in the time, form, and manner requested. The information may change pending final adoption by OMB.

For each grant that equals or exceeds \$25,000 in total grant award amount:

- a. The grantee organization's DUNS number (TEA will need to collect this information from grantees)
- b. The grant award number (i.e., NOGA ID number) assigned by TEA (TEA will have this information on file)
- c. The legal name of the grantee organization (as registered in the Central Contractor Registration (CCR), if registered) (TEA will have this information on file provided it is the same legal name on file with TEA)
- d. The physical location (street address) (as listed in the CCR, if registered) (TEA will have this information on file provided it is the same street address on file with TEA)
- e. The (federal) Congressional district number
- f. The grantee organization type (i.e., independent school district, nonprofit organization, etc) (TEA will have this information on file)
- a. The total amount of the grant award (TEA will have this information on file)
- h. The total amount paid to the grantee as of date of report (TEA will have this information on file)
- i. The physical location (street address) of the primary place of performance of the grant (TEA will have this information on file provided it is the same address on file with TEA.)
- j. An evaluation (i.e., status report) of the completion status of the project or activity (for example, Not Started; Less than 50% Completed; Completed 50% or More; Fully Completed) (It is not clear at this time whether this information will need to be collected from the grantees. TEA will notify the grantee in the event status information needs to be collected.)
- k. An estimate of the number of jobs created and the number of jobs retained by the project or activity and a brief description of the types of those jobs (i.e., job titles) (TEA will need to collect this information from grantees.)
- I. The names and total compensation of the five most highly compensated officers of the grantee organization if the organization in its preceding year received 80% or more of its annual gross revenues in Federal awards and \$25,000,000 or more in annual gross revenues from Federal awards and the public does not have access to information about the compensation of senior executives. (It is not known at this time whether this data element will be required once the data elements are finalized by OMB. If it is required in the final data elements, TEA will need to collect this information from the grantees.)

For grants that equal less than \$25,000 in total grant award amount or for grantees that in the previous tax year had gross income under \$300,000, amounts will be reported in the aggregate according to the following:

- a. The total number of grants awarded less than \$25,000 (TEA will have this information file)
- b. The total award (aggregate) amount for all grants less than \$25,000 (TEA will have this information on file)
- c. The total (aggregate) amount paid to grantees for all grants less than \$25,000 as of date of report (TEA will have this information on file)

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5. **Posting the Information on Public Website**: Not later than 30 days after the end of each calendar quarter, each federal agency, including the U.S. Department of Education, shall make the information in those reports publicly available by posting the information on the designated public website (Section 1512[d]). Grantees will not be required to post information on the public website unless they apply for and receive other ARRA grants directly from a federal government agency.

Once OMB adopts the final data reporting elements and TEA receives specific instructions for reporting, TEA will provide subsequent guidance to grantees related to required reporting information.

- H. Electronic Drawdown of ARRA Funds from TEA and Use of FAR Fund Codes: Recipients will draw down ARRA funds on an award-specific basis. Pooling of ARRA award funds with other funds for drawdown or other purposes is not permitted. Recipients must account for each ARRA award separately by referencing the assigned FAR (Financial Accounting and Resource) fund code for each award.
- **I. Availability of Records:** The applicant agrees to make all financial and programmatic records available in detail for inspection by TEA auditors, local independent auditors, and the offices described below.
- 1. **Examination of Records:** The Comptroller General of the United States and any of its employees, contractors, agents, representatives, or designees, may examine any records related to obligations and use by any state or local government of funds made available under ARRA. (Section 901[b]).
- 2. Access of Government Accountability Office (GAO): Each contract and each subcontract awarded using funds made available under ARRA shall provide that the Comptroller General of the United States and his representatives are authorized to examine any records of the contractor or any of its subcontractors, or any State or local agency administering such contract, that directly pertain to, and involve transactions relating to, the contract or subcontract and to interview any officer or employee of the contractor or any of its subcontractors, or of any State or local government agency administering the contract, regarding such transactions (Section 902).
- 3. Reviews by Inspector General: The inspector general of the U.S. Department of Education shall review, as appropriate, any concerns raised by the public about specific investments using funds made available in this Act. Any findings of such reviews shall be relayed immediately to the Secretary of Education. In addition, the findings of such reviews, along with any audits conducted by any inspector general of ARRA funds, shall be posted on the inspector general's website and linked to the recovery.gov website, except that portions of reports may be redacted to the extent the portions would disclose information that is protected from public disclosure under sections 552 and 552a of Title 5, United States Code (Section 1514).
- 4. Access of Offices of Inspector General to Certain Records and Employees: With respect to each contract or grant awarded using ARRA funds, any representative of an Inspector General of the U.S. Department of Education or other appropriate federal agency is authorized to examine any records of the contractor or grantee, any of its subcontractors or subgrantees, or any State or local agency administering such contract, that pertain to, and involve transactions relating to, the contract, subcontract, grant, or subgrant, and to interview any officer or employee of the contractor, grantee, subgrantee, or agency regarding such transactions (Section 1515).
- 5. **Recovery Accountability and Transparency Board:** Section 1521 of the ARRA establishes the Recovery Accountability and Transparency Board to coordinate and conduct oversight of ARRA funds to prevent fraud, waste, and abuse. The Board shall submit "flash reports" on potential management and funding problems that require immediate attention; quarterly reports; and annual reports to the President and Congress, including the Committees on Appropriations of the Senate and House of Representatives, summarizing the findings on the use of ARRA funds. The Board may conduct its own independent audits and reviews of ARRA funds. All reports shall be made publicly available on the www.recovery.gov website established by the Board. See paragraphs J and K below with regard to reports of suspected fraud or abuse (Sections 1523 and 1524).

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- Recovery Independent Advisory Panel: Section 1541 of the ARRA establishes the Recovery Independent Advisory
 Panel to make recommendations to the Recovery Accountability and Transparency Board on action the Board could
 take to prevent fraud, waste, and abuse relating to ARRA funds.
- **J. Disclosure of Fraud or Misconduct:** Each grantee awarded funds made available under the ARRA shall promptly refer to the USDE Office of Inspector General any credible evidence that a principal, employee, agent, contractor, subrecipient, subcontractor, or other person has submitted a false claim under the False Claims Act or has committed a criminal or civil violation of laws pertaining to fraud, conflict of interest, bribery, gratuity, or similar misconduct involving those funds.
- **K. Protection for Whistleblowers**: Section 1553 of the ARRA provides protection for State and local government and contractor whistleblowers. Any employee of any employer receiving ARRA funds may not be discharged, demoted, or otherwise discriminated against as a reprisal for disclosing, including a disclosure made in the ordinary course of an employee's duties, to the Recovery Accountability and Transparency Board, an inspector general, the U. S. Comptroller General, a member of Congress, a State or federal regulatory or law enforcement agency, a person with supervisory authority over the employee (or such other person working for the employer who has the authority to investigate, discover, or terminate misconduct), a court or grand jury, the head of a federal agency, or their representatives, information that the employee reasonably believes is evidence of (1) gross mismanagement of an agency contract or grant relating to ARRA funds; (2) a gross waste of ARRA funds; (3) a substantial and specific danger to public health or safety related to the implementation or use of ARRA funds; (4) an abuse of authority related to the implementation or use of ARRA funds; or (5) a violation of law, rule, or regulation related to an agency contract (including the competition for or negotiation of a contract), or grant, awarded or issued relating to ARRA funds. A person who believes that he or she has been subjected to a reprisal may submit a complaint regarding the reprisal to the inspector general for the appropriate federal agency (in most cases, the U.S. Department of Education).
- **L. Use of Funds:** The grantee agrees to comply with the applicable federal cost principles in the obligation and expenditure of ARRA funds as identified in the General Provisions and Assurances as well as other limitations or restrictions and expenditures identified therein. The grantee also agrees to the following:
- Consolidation of ARRA Administrative Funds: Due to the significant reporting requirements under ARRA, it is
 not known at this time whether grantees may consolidate ARRA administrative funds with other NCLB
 consolidated administrative funds. TEA will issue further guidance with regard to this provision once guidance is
 provided by the U.S. Department of Education. If ARRA funds are permitted to be consolidated with other NCLB
 consolidated administrative funds, grantees must still be able to report the types and number of jobs that were
 created or saved with ARRA funds.
- Combining ARRA funds on a Schoolwide Program. ARRA funds are permitted to be used on a Title I Part A
 schoolwide Campus/Program, funds may be combined with other funding sources, but grantees still must be able to
 identify precisely the items of obligation and expenditure for ARRA reporting. You must also be able to report the
 types and number of jobs that were created or saved with ARRA funds.
- 3. Special Contracting Provisions: To the maximum extent possible, contracts funded under the ARRA shall be awarded as fixed-price contracts through the use of competitive procedures. A summary of any new contract awarded with ARRA funds that is not fixed-price and not awarded using competitive procedures shall be posted in a special section of the www.recovery.gov website established by the Recovery Accountability and Transparency Board (Section 1554).

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- 4. **Use of Funds for Certain Expenditures Prohibited:** ARRA funds shall not be used for any casino or other gambling establishment, aquarium, zoo, golf course, or swimming pool (Section 1604).
- 5. **Use of Funds for Construction Prohibited:** Unless specifically authorized in the applicable program statute, regulations, guidelines, Request for Application (RFA), TEA Standard Application System (SAS), the approved grant application, or other written authorization, none of the ARRA additional formula funds shall be used for construction, remodeling, or renovation.
- 6. **Buy American Use of American Iron, Steel, and Manufactured Goods:** If construction is allowed and approved pursuant to the previous paragraph pertaining to "Use of Funds for Construction Prohibited", none of the funds may be used for the construction, alteration, maintenance, or repair of a public building or public work unless all of the iron, steel, and manufactured goods used in the project are produced in the United States unless waived by the Secretary of Education (Section 1605).
- 7. Wage Rate Requirements for Contracted Laborers and Mechanics— Compliance with the Davis-Bacon Act: Subject to further clarification issued by the Office of Management and Budget, and notwithstanding any other provision of law and in a manner consistent with other provisions of ARRA, all laborers and mechanics employed by contractors and subcontractors on projects funded directly by or assisted in whole or in part by and through the Federal Government pursuant to this award shall be paid wages at rates not less than those prevailing on projects of a character similar in the locality as determined by the Secretary of Labor in accordance with subchapter IV of chapter 31 of title 40, United States Code. With respect to the labor standards specified in this section, the Secretary of Labor shall have the authority and functions set forth in Reorganization Plan Numbered 14 of 1950 (64 Stat. 1267; 5 U.S.C. App.) and section 3145 of title 40, United States Code (Section 1606).
- M. Compliance with OMB Circular A-133 Audits and Schedule of Expenditures of Federal Awards:
 Grantees agree to separately identify the expenditures for each grant award funded under ARRA as required by Office of Management and Budget Circular A-133, "Audits of States, Local Governments, and Non-Profit Organizations" and to comply with all other provisions of the Single Audit Act and OMB Circular A-133.
