Preparation for Adult Living (PAL) Staff

There are a number of colleges and universities that are SIL locations. This partnership between DFPS and local colleges and universities assists students with their post-secondary goals by providing housing and transitional living support and assistance.

Prepare Students for Transition to Adulthood



Insurance

- All children and youth in the conservatorship of DFPS are enrolled in STAR Health.
- Medical coverage to young adults ages 18 to 25 who remain in extended foster care at age 18.

Driver's License

• Students in DFPS conservatorship, and those 18-21 living in a DFPS-paid foster care placement, are eligible for waived driver's license and state identification fees

Certified Copies of Birth Certificate, Social Security Card and I.D. Card

• Youth should receive certified copies (or the original) of these documents before their 16th birthday. School personnel can follow up with students to make sure they have received copies.





Prepare Students for Transition to Successful Adulthood



Documents students should receive or have no later than 30 days before exiting foster care:

- Birth Certificate
- Social Security Card
- Personal Identification (ID) card
- Immunization records
- Information contained in youth's Health Passport
- Proof of enrollment in Medicaid, if appropriate
- Any existing medical power of attorney regarding the youth

High School to College & Career



Texas College and Career Readiness School Models (CCRSM) Model

- Close gaps and equalize access to highquality education
- Programs and opportunities to acquire specialized skills, hands-on training, knowledge and experience

Early College High School (ECHS)

- Open-enrollment program that blends college and high school coursework
- Students can earn up to two years of college credit, tuition-free, while enrolled in high school

Texas Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (T-STEM)

- Open-enrollment program that engages students in rigorous STEM curriculum
- Students learn real-world contents;
 STEM enrichment activities: clubs and competitions

Pathways in Technology Early College High Schools (PTECH)

- Open-enrollment program that creates workforce pathways aligned with highdemand & high wage fields in the state
- Student work toward an associate degree while gaining hands-on work experience





Creating Post-Secondary Pathways



Career and Technical Education (CTE)

A sequence of courses that students with coherent and rigorous content.

Provides work-based learning and on-thejob training opportunities

Vocational Education

Link students to vocational education opportunities

Hands-on training and skill-based instructional environment.

Dual Credit

Eligible HS student enroll in college courses

Receive credit for the courses from both college & HS





Post-Secondary Pathways



Workforce Development Boards – **Workforce Solutions**

> **Workforce Solutions** office

Offer vocational education, job training and certificate programs, job preparedness, career exploration

Job Corps

Residential career training program

Helps eligible youth ages 16 -24 complete their HS education, train for meaningful careers and obtain employment





Dual Credit Course

Note: Enrollment in a dual credit course activates a student's lifetime Tuition and Fees Waiver (See Financial Supports for Post-Secondary Education, on page 143)

Post-Secondary Education Opportunities

LAW: Each public institution of higher education must designate a Higher Education Foster Care Liaison and report the name and contact information for the liaison to the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board (THECB). THECB also has a designated Foster Care Liaison.

Law: State law requires that school staff provide information to all students in grades 11 or 12 in substitute care about the tuition and fee waiver, dual credit, or other courses where a student may earn joint high school and college credit.

TIP: LEA Foster Care Liaisons are encouraged to link with local colleges and campus-based support programs to develop connections and facilitate effective transitions into post-secondary learning for students in foster care.





Financial Supports for Post-Secondary Education

College Tuition and Fee Waiver

 Some individuals formerly in TX foster care system qualify for a lifetime tuition and fee waiver at any TX state-supported institution of higher education, as long a student enrolls in at least one college or dual credit before turning 25.





College Tuition and Fee Waiver



- Youth are eligible to have college tuition and fee waived in TX statesupported colleges or universities, public medical schools, public dental schools, public junior colleges, and public technical institutions.
- A youth must have been in DFPS conservatorship before an adoption or PMC was granted to be eligible for the college tuition and fee waiver.
- School staff should help students to activate the college tuition and fee waiver while they are still in high school.



Note: The tuition and fee waiver is verified in the form of a letter from Texas Department of Family and Protective Services provided to the youth to present to their institution of higher education. Schools may require that the student provide new letter each academic year.





Education and Training Voucher (ETV) Program



ETV

Federally funded and state administered

Students may be eligible to receive up to \$5000 in financial assistance per year

Youth in foster care or adopted from DFPS after turning 16

Available to youth starting at age 16 up to 23


Used on expenses like books, transportation, other school-related costs

Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA)



Students applying for financial aid in Texas should submit their FAFSA applications by the priority deadline in order to maximize the amount of aid they may receive.

Did You Know?

In accordance with TEC § 28.0256, beginning in the 2021-2022 school year with students enrolled in the 12th grade, each student must do one of the following in order to graduate:

- ✓ Complete and submit a FAFSA;
- ✓ Complete and submit a Texas Application for State Financial Aid (TASFA); or
- ✓ Submit a signed opt-out form.





Preparing Students for College



Reminder: When students complete their college application via applytexas.org, close attention should be paid when filling out their current or prior foster care status. These questions help colleges and universities identify students who may be eligible to receive additional financial and campus supports.



TIP: Texas Lifetime Tuition and Fees Waiver

- > is activated regardless of whether a student completes a course
- > Contact student's PAL staff to confirm eligibility
- ▶ DFPS State Tuition and Fee Waiver Form is provided in a hard copy by TX DFPS. Request multiple copies.
- ➤ If new form is needed, contact Regional DFPS PAL staff where youth is form or DFPS state office
- Student must present hard copy when enrolling at a public TX higher education institution.





College Support Networks and College Campus Programs



Education Reach for Texans

- A statewide network focused on increasing college access and retention for foster care alumni.
- Works with colleges and universities promoting best practices for higher education for students formerly in foster care
- Do students need a bacterial meningitis vaccination in order to enter college?
- Yes. Texas college or university students cannot start classes until they show documentation that their vaccination or booster dose is current.
