Report of the State Board of Education Committee of the Full Board September 17, 2014

The State Board of Education Committee of the Full Board met at 9:05 a.m. on Wednesday, September 17, 2014, in the State Board of Education Room, #1-104, of the William B. Travis Building, 1701 N. Congress Avenue, Austin, Texas. All members of the committee were present, as follows:

The Committee of the Full Board heard public testimony on agenda item #4, #5, #6, #7 and #8. Information regarding the individuals who presented public testimony is included in the discussion of that item.

The Committee of the Full Board considered items in the following order: Items #1, #2, #3, #6, #4, #7, #9, #5, #8, #10.

ACTION ITEMS

1. Decision on the Percentage Distribution of the Permanent School Fund

(Board agenda page I-1) [Official agenda item #4]

Holland Timmins, executive administrator and chief investment officer, presented an overview of the item and discussed the concept of intergenerational equity and some of the factors that can influence intergenerational equity such as inflation and GLO contributions. Mr. Timmins commented on the board's objective to strive to maintain intergenerational equity when setting the distribution rate.

Carlos Veintemillas, deputy chief investment officer, presented the PSF staff recommendation for a distribution rate of between 3.25 % and 3.5%. Rhett Humphreys, partner, and Keith Stronkowsky, senior consultant, NEPC, the PSF general consultant, then presented NEPC's recommendation for a distribution rate of between 2.5% and 3.0%. Mr. Humphreys explained the staff recommendation was largely in agreement with NEPC's recommendation, with the only difference being the inflation forecast used in each approach.

<u>MOTION AND VOTE</u>: It was moved by Ms. Hardy, seconded by Mr. Ratliff, and carried to recommend to the State Board of Education that the percentage distribution rate to the Available School Fund from the Permanent School Fund for the 2016-2017 biennium shall be 3.5%.

The Committee of the Full Board took a break at 10:23 a.m., and reconvened at 10:40 a.m.

2. Proposed Revisions to 19 TAC Chapter 114, <u>Texas Essential Knowledge and Skills for Languages Other Than English</u>, Subchapter C, <u>High School</u>

(Second Reading and Final Adoption) (Board agenda page I-5)

Shelly Ramos, curriculum division director, explained that the proposed rule action would add new Texas Essential Knowledge and Skills (TEKS) for classical languages. The proposed rules would delay implementation of the high school languages other than English TEKS until 2017-2018 in order to align with the expected availability of instructional materials.

MOTION AND VOTE: It was moved by Mr. Ratliff, seconded by Dr. Dominguez, and carried unanimously to recommend that the State Board of Education, by an affirmative vote of two-thirds of the members of the board, approve for second reading and final adoption the proposed revisions to 19 TAC Chapter 114, Texas Essential Knowledge and Skills for Languages Other Than English, Subchapter C, High School, with an effective date of 20 days after filing as adopted with the Texas Register. (Mr. Cortez was absent for the vote.)

3. Proposed Amendments to TAC Chapter 114, <u>Texas Essential Knowledge and Skills for Languages Other Than English</u>, Subchapter A, <u>Elementary</u>, Subchapter B, <u>Middle School</u>, and Subchapter D, <u>Other Languages Other Than English Courses</u>

(First Reading and Filing Authorization)

(Board agenda page I-27)

Ms. Ramos explained that the proposed amendments would delay the implementation of the recently revised Texas Essential Knowledge and Skills for Languages Other Than English to the 2017-2018 school year in order to align with the expected availability of instructional materials.

MOTION AND VOTE: It was moved by Mr. Ratliff, seconded by Dr. Dominquez, and carried unanimously to recommend that the State Board of Education approve for first reading and filing authorization proposed amendments to 19 TAC Chapter 114, <u>Texas Essential Knowledge and Skills for Languages Other Than English</u>, Subchapter A, <u>Elementary</u>, Subchapter B, <u>Middle School</u>, and Subchapter D, <u>Other Languages Other Than English Courses</u>. (Mr. Cortez was absent for the vote.)

4. Proposed Amendments to 19 TAC Chapter 113, <u>Texas Essential Knowledge and Skills for Social Studies</u>, Subchapter D, <u>Other Social Studies Courses</u>

(First Reading and Filing Authorization)

Monica Martinez, associate commissioner for standards and programs, explained that the proposed amendments would explicitly require that Advanced Placement (AP) and International Baccalaureate (IB) courses that satisfy a specific social studies graduation requirement address the Texas Essential Knowledge and Skills (TEKS) for the corresponding course.

MOTION AND VOTE: It was moved by Mr. Rowley and seconded by Mr. Mercer to recommend that the State Board of Education approve for first reading and filing authorization proposed amendments to 19 TAC Chapter 113, <u>Texas Essential Knowledge and Skills for Social Studies</u>, Subchapter D, <u>Other Social Studies Courses</u>, so as to require that AP and IB social studies courses address the TEKS, as applicable.

7. Discussion of Dallas ISD Proposed Three-Year Graduation Program

Ms. Martinez explained that House Bill (HB) 1122, 83rd Texas Legislature, Regular Session, 2013 permits the Dallas Independent School District (ISD) to develop and implement a pilot program for students who wish to obtain a high school diploma in three years. The legislation requires that Dallas ISD submit a three-year graduation program to the commissioner of education for approval, and to the State Board of Education (SBOE) for review and comment. Ms. Martinez informed the committee that the commissioner of education has given preliminary approval of the Dallas ISD plan pending the committee's review and comments.
