ACTIVITIES THAT CAN SUPPORT YOUR CHILD'S TRANSITION TO LIFE AFTER HIGH SCHOOL

We all want our children to be successful in school and in life. For students receiving special education services, the word "transition" means a set of activities intended to help them transition to life after high school. These activities take into consideration individual student needs, preferences, and interests.

This chart provides you with a way to identify at-home learning that can help bring about good transition outcomes for your child. Age-appropriate grade levels are identified for each activity; because, as you know, transitioning to adulthood doesn't happen overnight. You can do many things to help your child develop skills that will allow him or her to be as independent as possible and focus on skills he or she may need in life after high school.

	Plan and prepare meals using cookbooks, magazines, or recipes from product boxes, a home collection, or online. Healthy Little Foodies is a website that helps with the benefits of cooking with kids.		×		
	Make a "commercial" using a phone or iPad that shows proper hygiene (e.g., shaving, brushing teeth, combing hair, handwashing , and social distancing practices).		×		
	Complete health assessments to determine needs and gather resources at <u>Got Transition</u> .				
	Research <u>living options</u> and determine the cost. Look for ads in the newspaper or online for the availability and cost of apartments, duplexes, or rental properties. Discuss whether your child will live independently or with roommates. If your child will be living at home, research ads for how much renting a room would cost. Do not forget to determine the cost of utilities such as Wi-Fi, electric, gas, water, etc.				
	Visit the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) to learn about road safety. Navigate the community using a preferred mode of transportation (e.g., car, bus). Plan the route, the amount of time it will take, and how much it will cost (i.e., gas, fare).
